Background: In his testimony before a Federal Grand Jury in connection with the ODESSIAN trial, GOLD stated that after his arrival in the US with his family in 1914, the family first lived in Arkansas, then Illinois, finally settling in Philadelphia. (NY Times, 16 Nov 50)

GOLD advised that he received most of his education in Philly later going to the Xavier College in Cincinnati being graduated in 1932 with a BS. (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950)

He advised that he became interested in Communism in 1933 (Washington Post, 16 Nov 1950)

GOLD stated that a chemist named BLACK had first interested him in espionage in

v 1935. BLACK had obtained a position at GOLD's firm with a G.T. Company. (DFB 8P90)

From sometime in 1946 to sometime in 1948, GOLD worked in Abraham BROTHMAN's Amherst Laboratories as Chief Chemist. He stated that of all the contacts he had in his 11 years of espionage work for the Sov. BROTHMAN was the only individual to know his correct name. GOLD stated this occurred when he went to work for BROTHMAN in 1946. GOLD has advised that his job with BROTHMAN was not very remunerative and said that when he quit the company in 1948, the company owed him around \$4,000 (NY Times 21 Nov)

pionage activities from 1935 to 1940.

GOLD has advised that he was recruited for Sov espionage in 1935 and that he continued to be active until 1946. (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950)

He advised that at first he was involved only in industrial espionage (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950). In 1935 BLACK persuaded GOLD to meet his superior Paul Smith aka Paul PETERS

One of his assignments was to steal chemical processes from the Penn. Sugar Co., real name unknown where he was employed as a research chemist, and its subsidiaries. The formulas which were used in the manufacture of industrial solvents he turned over to a man known to him only as "Paul Smith", who had identified himself as a representative of Gold Standard MFG. (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950) Gold's superior informed Smith/personal sources "FED. INDUSTRIAL prices"

GOLD has stated that a chemist named BLACK first interested him in espionage in 1935, in November. GOLD said that he was also motivated by a feeling of gratitude towards BLACK because the latter had obtained a job for him with a N. J. concern in 1933, "the worst part of the depression." GOLD stated that BLACK had saved his family from having to go on relief. (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950). Over a period of years, Gold was brought along by the espionage activities in the US from 1940 on.

GOLD has stated that in Sept 1941 he came to NY from Philly after having received instructions from SM.

From 1940 July and until his return to the USSR in Sept 1944, Semen V. SEDOV was GOLD's superior. (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950 & Nov 17, 1950)

He advised that in 1940 he began to function as a courier for an espionage ring. His job was to approach Americans whose names had been supplied to him and to obtain material which he passed on to SEDOV (ibid).

From Sept 44 to Feb 46, YAKOVLEV G. JOSEPH was his superior. (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950)

Following of BROTHMAN:

Prior to 1940 Abraham BROTHMAN, a chemical engineer in the NY area had been handled, first by Jacob COLOS whom he knew as JEFF and later by Elisabeth BENTLEY whom he knew as "ELLEN". In around 1941 BROTHMAN told BENTLEY that he desired a new contact who knew technical matters. BENTLEY advised that she passed this request on to COLOS her superior and from then on he was contacted by someone else. (ibid)

She has advised that she contacted BROTHMAN up to Sept 1941. (ibid)

GOLD has advised that in 1941 he was told by his superior BROTHMAN to wait on a street in the upper 20's between 6th and 7th Avenue on the night of 22 Sept 1941

From Sept 44 to Feb 46, YAKOVLEV G. JOHN was his superior. APPROVED FOR RELEASE Date 10 NOV 1950  
Handling of BROTHMAN:

Prior to 1940 Abraham BROTHMAN, a chemical engineer in the NY area had been handled, first by Jacob COLOS whom he knew as JET and later by Elisabeth BETTLEY whom he knew as "HELEN". In around 1941 BROTHMAN told BETTLEY that he desired a new contact who knew technical matters. BETTLEY advised that she passed this request on to COLOS her superior and from then on he was contacted by someone else.

She has advised that she contacted BROTHMAN up to Sept 1941. <sup>SHENKOV</sup> was SAM

GOLD has advised that in 1941 he was told by his superior <sup>SHENKOV</sup> to wait on a street in the upper 20<sup>th</sup> between 6th and 7th Avenues on the night of 29 Sept 1941 until a car pulled up that bore the license number which had previously been given to him by SHENKOV. GOLD stated that he sat in beside the driver whom he had identified as BROTHMAN and gave the recognition signal which was "greetings from Helen" or "I bring regards from HELEN." (On 14 Nov 1950 BETTLEY testified that she was HELEN)

According to GOLD, he and BROTHMAN subsequently had dinner and during dinner BROTHMAN told him how dissatisfied he had been with HELEN (BETTLEY) and with another Soviet agent (presumably COLOS) because of their lack of knowledge of chemistry and said he was glad GOLD had come on the scene. (NY Times, 16 Nov 1950)

GOLD advised that he and BROTHMAN met at another restaurant about 10 days after their initial meeting at which time GOLD conveyed to BROTHMAN SHENKOV's desire for any and all information regarding matters of military interest, and gave him a specific list. (NY Times 16 Nov 1950)

Through Ferdinand Philip HELLER, Subj. and Thomas L. BLACK became associated with the Russians, but HELLER himself was never accepted by them.

Subj. told Special Agents he met Thomas L. BLACK in 1933 at the HOLBROOK MFG. CO. in Jersey City, New Jersey, through Fred HELLER, who was an employee of the Penn. Sugar Co., Philad. Last time he saw HELLER was in 38 or 40.




SANICHEV, Filip Tikhonovich in [REDACTED] Sept 1941 in Sov's Philadelphia residence - met GOLD and acted as his superior, replacing YAKOVLEV. He was questioned quite extensively by SANICHEV, but not asked to find out any more info. at that time. The Russ. wanted to wait and see if Subj. [REDACTED] was being watched at all and if he might again be called in for questioning by FBI. [REDACTED] re as DFB-34960, 14 May 54.

Subj advised that he received expense money from all his Sov superiors. During the period he was handled by YAKOVLEV, he rec'd ca £750 to £1,000. In 1944 GOLD served as the cut-out between Klaus FUCHS, a Soviet agent who came to the US Dec 1943 as a member of the Brit Mission collaboration with the Manhattan project, in late 45 or early 46 SEMERIKS was arrested in the UK in April 1950 and charged with the delivery of atomic secrets to GOLD that

FUCHS was in the US in 1944 and 1945 and met GOLD during this period in Boston, MA. FUCHS delivered to GOLD, info, both oral and written re atomic energy for delivery to the Soviets.

GOLD then delivered the info to a Soviet superior.

GOLD has admitted that he was guilty.

JOHN (Amedeo Vajcovic) (See card on subject)

DEP, fmu. Alleged import Sov Agent living in NYC, 33 East 22nd St. This apt. reported as a center for the meeting of many Sov agents. Info from DIA 83. For other see card on PHOEP.

GERT or GOTTHELF, Russian Jew. Allegedly the first collaborator in the USSR to establish intimate relations with GOLD. Reportedly all new collaborators must establish contact with HELGOTT to be presented to Embassy if necessary (DIA 83). See card on subject)

NAKOV, Sergei. Live NY area. Allegedly the first who received data re atomic info from GOLD and this material he took to Moscow (DIA 83) (See card on subject)

NAZ, Emanuel. Russian Jew in NY area. Member of the "Russian American Friendship Committee" and reportedly received money from that committee to pay agents. Radio owner who specializes in Russian propaganda (DIA 83).

REILINGER, fmu. Attached to Czech consulate in NYC (DIA 83).

RHS, Klaus. XXXXXXXXXX See part on GOLD's esp activities.

SEEMERG, Julius and Ethel. Both were arrested by the FBI on charges of espionage behalf of the Soviets. It has been reported that the FBI has stated that the SEEMERGS were involved in a conspiracy with GOLD.

WEIT, Paul. His first superior. AKA Paul PETRAVEN

MAX, Emanuel. Russian Jew in NY area. Member of the "Russian America Friendship Committee" and reportedly received money from that committee to pay agents. Radio announcer who specializes in Russian propaganda (FMA 83).
