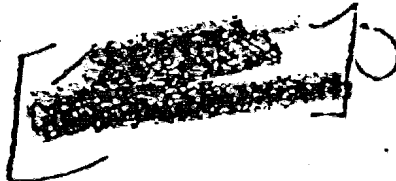

Dear Dr. Stratton:

Remembering your request to be kept informed of any progress in the problem of "unidentified flying objects," this letter will bring you up to date.

Last December, the section of the Air Technical Intelligence Center charged with investigation of reports of sightings presented a status briefing at the Agency. Based upon the evidence presented, the subject was discussed at a December meeting of the Intelligence Advisory Committee (CIA, Army, Navy, Air Force, Joint Staff, State, AEC, and FBI). At that time it was recommended that CIA should assemble a panel of highly qualified personnel to examine the problem and its ramifications. Particular competency in the fields of physics, radar and astronomy was believed desirable.

We were fortunate to obtain the services of especially qualified men, I believe you will agree. Enclosed for your information are copies of the report submitted by the Panel and related material. We concur in the conclusions and recommendations of the Panel, and are forwarding the report to appropriate authorities. Since the problems related to this subject appear to be operational rather than intelligence in nature, we will be concerned only indirectly in the future. However, if there are any developments in which we believe you might be interested, we shall inform you. Incidentally, knowledge of any interest of CIA in the subject of "flying saucers" has been carefully restricted, in view of probable misunderstanding if it were publicly known.

Minutes of FBI Advisory Group on Unidentified Flying Objects,  
14-17 January 1953

1. At your request I represented FBI Division at the subject meetings. 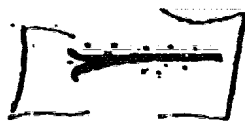

4. The following persons were invited to present certain background information to the Advisory Group:

Captain Edward Howell, AFSC who presented information on the work of Capt. Mitchell (and his predecessors "George", "Samuel", and "Jim") and discussed in detail many of their specific investigations.

Major Kenneth Brown (by now on inactive status and with the Army Corp.) who presented slides in support of AFSC. Representatives of the Navy photographic lab who presented their analysis of files of a "sighting."

5. The first business on the agenda was approved by and a change (Att. #1) to the group by [Dr. C. W. Hall]. This was followed by a statement of the GSI interest by [Mr. Strong]. GSI had been requested by [Mr. Hall] to look into the "flying saucer problem" because of their related national security problems: (a) possible exploitation to produce more bacteria, (b) the confirmations and dangers inherent in observations of "flying saucers" by the U.S. radar and observer services, (c) the accuracy of "flying saucer reports" overloading the emergency communication facilities of the Department of Defense.

6. Because of the quality of the consultants and the excellence of their introduction to the subject by [Dr. C. W. Hall] and [Mr. Strong], the Advisory Group never lost sight of its goals in spite of the fact that the discussion took many excursions.

7. The Advisory Group submitted its report to AD/CI on 17 January 1953. Their principal finding was that at the present time the unidentified flying objects pose no threat to the security of the United States. They recommended the establishment of programs of education regarding the sightings particularly as concerns the U.S. radar and observer system, and for the general public as well.

8. Most of the GSI files on this subject are being retained in the office of the AD/CI. Weapons Division has a considerable file which according to [Mr. Stevenson], they would like to dispose of because of the findings of the Advisory Group that "flying saucers" pose no present threat to the United States security. [Mr. Grant] feels that the material in the Weapons Division file should be maintained in one of the substantive Divisions of GSI and has suggested that R&E Division take this over and maintain them. [Mr. Stevenson] of Weapons Division currently has the material and estimates that several hours per week will be required to keep it current. He indicates that he is suggesting to [Mr. Tamm], Chief of Weapons Division, that R&E Division get the files. I would like to suggest that the Acting Chief, R&E Division discuss this with [Mr. Tamm]. I personally don't see why R&E Division has any greater interest in this material than Weapons Division.


9. If GP Branch, R&E Division is given the responsibility for the files mentioned in paragraph 8, above, one (1) additional case will be required.



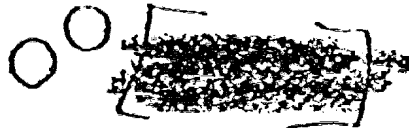

CHAIRMAN TO O/SI ADVISORY GROUP ON UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. To review available evidence on unidentified flying objects and to consider possible dangers to national security related thereto.
2. To advise concerning the amount and kind of data necessary for a scientific evaluation of these phenomena.
3. In particular to comment on:
  - a. Validity of current CIA evaluation of related dangers.
  - b. Methodology and scope of current and planned AFIC investigation.
  - c. Advisability of further meetings of this group or further review of the subject by a larger panel.





POSSIBLE EXPLANATIONS

A. Hysteria, hallucinations, hoaxes, etc. (Psychological)

B. Misidentifications of conventional objects:

- 1. Aircraft, missiles, searchlight reflections, etc. (man-made, controlled)
- 2. Balloons, kites, etc. (man-made, uncontrolled)
- 3. Birds, bugs, etc. (animal)
- 4. Dust, seeds (e.g. dandelion), paper, etc. (foreign matter)

C. Natural Phenomena:

- 1. Light aberrations, reflections, refractions, etc.
- 2. Anomalous radar propagation.
- 3. Ionization, static electricity, ball lightning, etc.
- 4. Planets, meteors and other astronomical bodies.
- 5. Others.
