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KHRUSHCHEV'S TRICKS MUST BE WATCHED

(Excerpts) The CPSU Central Committee two days ago made public a so-called political program for the forthcoming elections of the USSR Supreme Soviet. The program says that the Soviet Union will continue to follow the policy of peaceful coexistence among nations having different social systems. Simultaneously, TASS news agency announced that the Soviet Union had decided to release U.S. U-2 pilot Powers in an attempt to improve U.S.-Soviet relations.

Obviously, these Moscow tricks were prearranged in the wake of the second visit to the United States by Khrushchev's son-in-law and prior to the scheduled visit to the Soviet Union by President Kennedy's press secretary. They are aimed at creating a friendly atmosphere in U.S.-Soviet relations, and domestically at misleading the Soviet people.

In the CPSU Central Committee's political program for the forthcoming elections, the Soviet Union in fact does not give up its ambitions of intensifying subversive activities in democratic countries. The program says: "We must support the struggles of suppressed peoples for freedom and independence." Khrushchev has been secretly stretching out his devilish hands to Indonesia, Iran, and the Republic of Korea, in addition to Cuba, the Congo, Vietnam, and Laos which are already considered "things in his bag."

However, Khrushchev hopes that these subversive and aggressive plots can be fulfilled under the cloak of so-called peaceful coexistence, and prevent a direct clash with the United States. Therefore, after swashbuckling for a certain period of time, Khrushchev has again clamored for improvement of U.S.-Soviet relations and proposed a Moscow conference with President Kennedy.

The White House this time has responded coldly and carefully to Khrushchev's tricks, and does not consider that U.S.-Soviet relations can be improved through the exchange of Powers for a Soviet spy. However, it should be pointed out that Khrushchev might still have other new tricks aimed mainly at launching side attacks on the United States and at eventually trying to isolate and defeat it. Therefore, the United States should be firm and take decisive actions to cope with Khrushchev's wicked tricks. By so doing, the United States will be triumphant tactically and be able to halt communist aggression.

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
