GREEK ATTACKS CALLED IRRESPONSIBLE

(Excerpts) In its foreign political commentary, POLITIKA refers to articles in some Greek papers directed against Yugoslavia and points out that the articles are completely at variance with the policy and strivings of both countries for friendly and good neighborly relations between Yugoslavia and Greece. In these irresponsible anti-Yugoslav articles, Yugoslavia is accused (of allegedly?) raising the Macedonian issue.

RADIO CARRIES REPORTS ON POWERS TRIAL

(Editor's Note--M) Belgrade Serbian at 1830 GMT on Aug. 17 carries a London report by Tomo Martelanc on the American-British talks concerning the nuclear tests conference in Geneva. London believes that the British want "to retain Geneva as a bridge across the deepening chasm between the East and the West, especially now that the Powers trial in Moscow may cause a considerable deterioration in the international atmosphere."

Belgrade Serbian at 1830 GMT on Aug. 17 carries a three-minute factual report on the Powers trial.

Belgrade Serbian at 1400 GMT on Aug. 18 carries a one and a half minute factual report by its Moscow correspondent, Zivojin Stakic, on the second day of the Powers trial.

Belgrade Serbian at 1830 GMT on Aug. 18 carries a four-minute factual report by Stakic which concludes with an illustration of "how Powers is facing the trial," summarizing an interrogation by the presiding judge. The report shows Powers in his answers admitted he knew he would violate the Soviet borders, obeyed orders, thus harming his own country, and never thought he might cause an armed conflict, but felt very sorry.
