Body of American Killed In Bay of Pigs Identified

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — The FBI has identified the body of a pilot killed in the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion as that of an Alabama man.

The body, frozen in a Havana morgue for 17 years, was identified by the FBI after Cuban officials sent fingerprints to Washington, a spokeswoman for the House Foreign Relations Committee said. Janine Mann said the body was identified as that of Thomas Willard Ray of Center Point, Ala.

Ray was one of four American pilots killed in the attack, all from Alabama. He was shot by Cuban militiamen after his plane crash-landed near Fidel Castro's combat headquarters 20 miles from the invasion site.

Bay of Pigs Pilot

BIRMINGHAM—The FBI has identified the body of a pilot killed in the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion as that of an Alabama man.

- Labor Day weekend traffic accidents claimed the lives of 502 persons across the nation, compared to a pre-holiday estimate by the National Safety Council that highway deaths could total between 450 and 550. Last year there were 537 deaths.

- Former beauty queen Joyce McKinney, accused kidnapping her Mormon boyfriend and forcing him to have sex with her in England last year, pleaded guilty in Asheville, N.C., to using a false name to obtain a passport. She was given a two-year suspended sentence and fined \$2,000.
