: Data on Soviet Trade and Tourism

- 1. The attached tables provide the information you requested at our meeting on June 11.
- 2. The Soviet aircraft exports represent all exports—
 it was not possible to break down exports into those for
 CEMA countries and for the West. In addition to the data
 provided in the table on Soviet tourist traffic, we estimate
 that net Soviet tourism earnings were \$140 million in 1974
 and \$115 million in 1973. Data received since publication
 of the USSR: Long-Range Prospects for Hard Currency Trade
 given to you put Soviet hard currency exports in 1974 at
 \$7.63 billion and imports at \$8.54 billion. These figures
 replace the 1974 estimates for the merchandise trade account
 in Table 3.
