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Foreword

This is one of a series of reports published since 1962 which are designed to analyze the number and flags of merchant ships arriving in Cuban ports and the level and composition of imports and exports. The statistics are obtained by aggregating data on individual voyages.

All ship tonnages reported are expressed as gross register tons (GRT), which is a measure of the cubic space of a ship expressed in tons at the rate of 1 GRT per 100 cubic feet. The GRT figures assigned to the shipping discussed are taken from *Lloyd's Register of Shipping*. The volume of cargo is expressed in metric tons, and dry cargo data include that carried on passenger ships as well as on dry cargo ships. Yugoslav shipping is included in Free World shipping. Data for 1968 are preliminary. Because of rounding, components may not add to the totals shown.

Shipping to Cuba in 1968 and Trends Since
the Missile Crisis

Summary

Three Soviet military shipments in the first six weeks of 1968 marked the end of a 17-month cycle of military deliveries that updated, but probably did not expand significantly, Cuba's inventory of military equipment. These deliveries (September 1966 to mid-February 1968) totaled 31 shiploads containing 64,000 tons of military cargo. The lapse in military shipments since then probably is only a pause, and a new cycle of resupply may be in the offing, as a Cuban military delegation visited Moscow in November 1968. During 1963-68 the USSR shipped 136,000 tons of military equipment to Cuba. These shipments contained both new weapons and replacements, as well as spare parts, and included significant quantities of fighter aircraft, guided missile patrol boats, and subchasers.

Cuba's overall volume of seaborne trade in 1968, about 15 million tons, was down 4 percent from the record level of 1967 because of a drop in exports of sugar. Total imports remained about the same in 1968, although general cargo increased 14 percent and cement and metal products dropped 17 percent and 9 percent, respectively. About 80 percent of Cuba's imports and 45 percent of its exports were carried on Soviet ships. Free World ships carried 13 percent of Cuba's imports and 33 percent of its exports in 1968, up slightly from 1967.

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Since the missile crisis in October 1962, there has been a major shift in the carriage of Cuban trade from Free World to Communist shipping. Arrivals of Free World ships declined from more than 60 percent of the total prior to the missile crisis to about 20 percent in 1968, largely because of US pressures to discourage participation of Free World ships in the Cuban trade. This decline has been more than offset by increased Soviet arrivals with substantially greater average cargo-carrying capacity. Table 1 summarizes the changes in Cuban shipping and seaborne trade between 1963 and 1968.

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While total imports have increased 38 percent since 1963, petroleum products and fertilizer have more than tripled, and chemicals have more than doubled. Imports of crude oil, Cuba's largest single import, rose only 5 percent because of the limited capacity at Cuban refineries. There has been a slight decrease in general cargo imports, a reflection of the prolonged industrial stagnation in Cuba.

Exports have fluctuated widely with changes in the sugar harvest, which accounted for more than 80 percent of total exports during 1963-68. The sharp cutback in sugar exports in 1968 broke the upward trend in the proportion of total exports going to Communist countries as Cuba chose to sustain sugar exports to Free World countries in order to gain hard currency. During the five-year period, Japan more than quadrupled its imports from Cuba and replaced the United Kingdom as Cuba's best Free World customer.

No major changes in the pattern of Communist and Free World shipping to Cuba or in the level of Cuban seaborne trade are expected in 1969.

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Ship Arrivals

1. There were 1,006 ship arrivals in Cuba in 1968, slightly below the record level in 1967. Although arrivals increased only 12 percent since 1963, their cargo carrying capacity was 29 percent higher in 1968 than in 1963. As shown in Table 2 (and in greater detail in Tables 6 and 7), there was a significant shift in the relative participation of Communist, Cuban, and Free World ships in Cuba's seaborne foreign trade during the past six years.

2. The number of Free World ship arrivals dropped by more than one-half immediately after the 1962 missile crisis and has since dropped further as the result of US efforts (legislation, sanctions, and moral suasion) to discourage Free World ships from participating in Cuban trade (see Table 8).

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Between 1962 and 1968 the share of Free World ships in total arrivals went from 63 percent to 21 percent (see Figure 1). An increase in Soviet arrivals made up for the largest portion of this drop in Free World tonnage, whereas Eastern European and Cuban ship arrivals increased much less. The upward trend in Cuban arrivals is the result of additions to the Cuban merchant fleet, which grew from 28 ships (1,000 GRT and larger) in 1963 to 48 ships in 1968.

3. The flags of 12 Free World countries were represented in the 1968 arrivals, but Cypriot and UK ships accounted for more than 60 percent of 210 Free World arrivals. During the past six years ships owned by the Greek shipping magnate Achilles Frangistas have played a prominent role in Free World shipping to Cuba; in 1968 his ships accounted for about 20 percent of the Free World arrivals. The decline in Greek arrivals in 1968 compared with 1967, as shown in the following tabulation, was the result of the transfer of at least seven Frangistas-owned-or-controlled ships from Greek to Cypriot and Somalian registry*:

Volume of Trade and Cargoes

4. Cuban seaborne trade in 1968 was 35 percent above the level for 1963, an average annual rate of growth of more than 6 percent (see Tables 9, 10, and 11). The volume of trade in 1968, however, was

* In late 1968, Frangistas, in response to continued pressure by the Greek government, again promised to remove his ships from the Cuban trade. Calls by his ships at Cuban ports declined appreciably during the first two months of 1969, suggesting that Frangistas may be withdrawing them from the trade, including those under Cypriot and Somalian registry.

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4 percent below the record level of 1967 as a result of a sharp drop in exports of sugar. Since 1963, imports have increased at a somewhat higher rate than exports, which have varied greatly from year to year because of fluctuations in the size of the sugar harvest. The total volume of exports, for example, rose by more than 20 percent in 1965 and 1967 and fell by more than 10 percent in 1966 and 1968 (see Table 12). Imports since 1963, by contrast, fell only in one year, 1965, when they dropped by 6 percent. Imports in 1968 were 38 percent above the 1963 level, and exports were up 31 percent, as shown in Table 3.

5. Imports of crude oil, Cuba's largest single import, rose only 5 percent in 1963-68. The major constraint to larger imports of crude oil is the capacity of Cuban refineries, which is about equal to record imports in 1968 of nearly 4 million tons.* Because of this limitation, higher levels of consumption of petroleum have been met through increased imports of refined products, which grew from 0.4 million tons in 1963 to more than 1.3 million tons in 1968. Imports of crude oil and petroleum products combined in 1968 were 2 percent higher than the 1967 level and 27 percent above 1963.

6. Dry cargo imports in 1968 were about the same as in 1967, but most categories showed sizable increases above the 1963 level, particularly fertilizer, which increased 276 percent (see Figure 2). Imports of foodstuffs also increased, but by only 16 percent in 1963-68. The only significant category of imports that declined was general cargo, which was slightly lower in 1968 than in 1963, reflecting the curtailment of Cuba's industrialization program.

7. Communist countries consistently accounted for more than 80 percent of Cuban imports during 1963-68 and were the largest market for Cuban exports, as shown in the following tabulation:

* All of Cuba's crude oil imports in 1968 came from the USSR.

8. The USSR provided 77 percent of Cuba's total imports in 1968, Eastern European countries and Communist China each delivered 2 percent, and North Korea and North Vietnam together were the source of less than 1 percent. These shares have not changed significantly during the past four years. Cuban imports originating in the Free World, however, were up from 15 percent in 1967 to 18 percent in 1968, the largest share since 1964. More than one-third of the Free World cargoes were food-stuffs -- wheat and flour from Canada and corn from Mexico -- purchased on Soviet account and shipped to Cuba on Soviet ships. Fertilizer, largely from France, the Netherlands, and Italy, accounted for an additional one-third of imports originating in the Free World. Other cargoes included pharmaceuticals from the Netherlands, chemicals from Italy and Japan, and vehicles from Spain and France.


9. Total Cuban exports declined 13 percent in 1968 compared with 1967, and sugar exports fell 18 percent (see Table 12, and, for greater detail for 1967-68, Table 13). Exports of sugar to the USSR were cut back sharply, while those to Free World countries were sustained, and even increased, in order to gain hard currency (see Table 4).* Consequently, the upward trend in the proportion of total exports to Communist countries fell for the first time since 1963.

* Among Free World countries, Japan, Morocco, and Spain have been the largest purchasers of Cuban sugar and the United Kingdom the largest purchaser of molasses.

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
Ship Arrivals in Cuba, by Flag

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10. Although sugar has accounted for more than 80 percent of Cuba's exports each year, other commodities have gradually increased in importance. Exports of molasses, ores, tobacco, and fruits have grown 41 percent since 1963, reaching 950,000 tons in 1968, or 18 percent of total exports.

Military Shipments

11. Three Soviet ships delivered of military cargo in the first six weeks of 1968, completing a 17-month cycle of military deliveries that started in September 1966 and consisted of of military cargo delivered on 31 Soviet ships. There were no military deliveries in 1968 after February. The longest pause previously was seven months, from December 1964 to July 1965. The latest pause probably does not reflect a change in policy, and a new cycle of resupply may now be in the offing, as a Cuban military delegation visited Moscow in November 1968.*

12. Fifty-five Soviet ships carried a total of 136,000 tons of military cargoes to Cuba during 1968. As shown in Table 5, the of military cargo delivered in 1967 was the largest amount delivered in any year since 1962, when 125 Soviet ships delivered approximately in a three-month period prior to the missile crisis

* On 2 January 1969 the Soviet ship Yunyy Leninec (12,285 GRT) loaded with military cargo transited the Bosphorus,

At least part of the cargo was unloaded en route at Latakia and Alexandria.
