1. The following information submitted by the Assistant Chief of Staff, Intelligence, 200th AGF, is being furnished to you as a briefing document with information in foreign and domestic intelligence that pertains to the above subject and request.

2. ACQUER (Anti-Communist and Anti-Cosmopolitanism Brigade), Dr. Denis Dargovskii, br. - Anti-Communist Center of Information Movement of Peoples of Russia, an organization with headquarters in Moscow, is presently headed by an unnamed person. Initially the organization consisted of a number of General Vlasov followers who were active in the "Free Russian Service" during the 1940's. Dargovskii came after World War II. With its members presently comprised of civilians as well as former military officers, this organization is primarily engaged in political activities. Former military personnel also form a part of the organization. The organization called ROB (Russian Cosmopolitanism Brigade, br. - Russian Liberation Movement). Organized along military lines ROB is similar to other Russian organizations of military character in that its principal aim is to organize itself in such a manner as to facilitate the rapid mobilization of all the soldiers in exile in the Soviet Union of western Europe. Another organization of a military character subordinate to ACQUER, is SVOD (Soviet Volunteer Cosmopolitanism Brigade, br. - "The Union of Members of the Liberation Movement"). General Olasovskii, originally a member of ACQUER, left this organization to form ZAP (a paramilitary organization) he used in above referenced IR-101-48, 154-1153). However, some of the officers with military background also did not wish to abandon ACQUER for ed SVOD as a paramilitary organization a hindrance to life.

Most major sources are aware of the probability of Soviet infiltration in the Western regions or at least in Germany, particularly in the SAZ. One of the major problems is that of exposing Soviet agents who are trying surreptitiously to disrupt the organizations, create dissension over the members and influence organizational policies in a manner objectionable to the Western Powers.
