Biographical Data of HODOSY-STROBL, Pal (Paul)

I. Military Service

18 August 1915 to 1 November 1918:

Platoon-leader and company commander with the Infantry Regiment No. 31 of the VESZPREM Honved.

15 January to late July 1918:

Detached to the Air Force (Compnay No. 45) as observer and radio officer.

Mid-November 1918 to late August 1919:

Ordered by the Honved Ministry for duty with the combat group of the state police and the BUDAPEST police.

September 1919 to September 1920:

Company commander and battalion executive officer with the Infantry Regiment No. 1 of the National Army stationed in TOLNA and SALGOTARJAN.

September 1920 to 15 June 1921:

Company commander of the independent bycicle company No. 7 stationed in KAPOSVAR.

II. Service with the Rural Police (Gendarmerie)

15 June 1921 to May 1922:

Rural police officers' training, subsequent trial commitment.

June 1922 to 15 May 1926:

Stationed with the District Commander of the rural police battalion in ZEPLEWAGARD and SAROSPATAK. -2- no

1926 15 May/to October 1935:

With the rural police section and the security section of the Home Department:

November 1935 to August 1938:

Commander of the Searching and Locating Section (Fahndungsstelle) of the rural police headquarters.

1 September 1938 to 15 January 1939:

Commander of the rural police battalion in SZOINOK.

10 November 1938:

Committed temporarily as commander of the rural police in the area of UNGVAR (Carpathian Ukraine).

15 January 1939 to 15 July 1939:

Detached to the case officer with the rural police district command.

From 15 March 1939:

Deputy commander of the then organized "Karpaten Gendarmerie Batallion" (Carpathian Rural Police Battalion) in UNGVAR.

15 July 1939 to 15 November 1940:

Commander of the rural police battalion in HUSZT.

15 November 1940 to 31 December 1942:

Commander of the rural police battalion in MARAMAROSSZICET (East Hungary).

January 1943 to 31 December 1945:

Head of the "Reglements-Verfassungs- und Studien Komission" in ${\tt EUDAPEST},$ in the rank of ${\tt Colonel}$.

III. Commercial activities.

On 1 January 1944 I applied for a pension which was granted by the Ministry. I then continued to manage more intensively the fruit culture which I had started in 1932; at the same time I cooperated with several firms as wholesale dealer. In April 1944 I was appointed managing director of the "Landes Bezugs/ und Verwertungsgenossenschaft der Ungarischen Katholischen Grossgrundbesitzer", Budapest, Teleki Pal Str. 23/ III.

IV. Police Service.

In 1944 I was appointed case officer for the re-organization of the police which was to be done in the pattern of the rural police; I was to submit a draft. As to the execution of the plan, the Home Ministry ordered that I, until the re-organization was completed, had the same rights in principle as a rural police inspecteur, i.e. I had no influence on any official duty of the police. The job was to take 6 months and I was permitted to coninue my activities as managing director of the firm all the time, which I did until the Soviets marched into bungary.

On 20 January 1945 I was appointed Police Inspecteur and Police brigadier general.

On 1 April 1.45, I, together with police and their families was evacuated to Lower Bevaria (GANCKOFEN near EGGENFELDEN).

Gentlemen,

An Assurance ist purported to have been forwarded your Comission on or about 16 October 1949 by the Superior of a convent located at 205 Major Avenue, Arrochar Park, Staten Island, New York, on behalf of the following Hungarian Refugees:

Mr. Paul and Mrs (Eva) HODOSY, and their daughter Csilla, age 13 yrs located at Munich, Germany, Haimhauser Str. 25.II.

(He to perform gardening; she to act as a domestic).

It was eypected that the Assurance and authorisation would arrive in Frankfurt the end of November last, but till 9 January 1950 no word has been forwarded by the Commission, which is the reason for this inquiry.

My wife and I are personally acquainted with the Hodosy family for the last thirty years in all, and have been in correspondence with them in a desultory way, except for the War Years. Therefore, if any information as regards this family is desired, the both of us are well qualified to furnish such. During the period 4 March 1945 and 24 September 1946, I was the US Naval Member of the Allied Control Comission for Hungary located in Budapest, and I inquired into their conduct during the War Years and am satisfied that such was correct as could be exercised under the difficult

circumstances they found themselves, and their helpfulness to persecuted jewry earned them much praise which I personally heard.

It would be greatly appreciated by me to learn from you concerning the status of the Hodosy family at your earliest convenience, including any suggestions as to how either my wife and I can assist in their being admitted here, in accordance with the Assurance which we understand was given that they would be gainfully employed an not become public charges.

Annex No. 4

HODOSY-STROBL's Activities for our Organization.

- l. Subject was in contact with US officers since the fall of 1:47. On 4 January 1948, Mr. SANFORD asked him to do intelligence work. The final agreement was made on 9 January 1948 with Capt. ALLEN; at this occasion, 5 other members of the organization were present. Subject was appointed leader of a group of 50 persons which was missioned to do positive intelligence in the economic, military and political field in Hungary (via Austria, Czechoslovekia and Yugoslavia). It was agreed that he be supplied with financial means, documentation and 2 pasenger cars and economic cover through a firm in MUNICH or vicinity.
- 2. Subject was not given any intelligence training by our organization.
- 3. Subject organized the Group W.P. (TSCHARDAS). Details see below.

The Group TSCHARDAS supplied us with a total of 639 reports (within their activities in 24 months) of which 50 % were contained in reports transmitted, while 50 % were evaluated for the card files.

From 1 November 1919 to late way 1920, Subject was committed as battalion executive officer in SALGOTARJAN (North Hungary) at the Czech border; he was given the specific mission to do CI as well as positive intelligence work at the border.

From 22 June to May 1926 he did - beside his duties as rural police - CI work in the area of SATORALJAUJHKLY and the TISZA.

In 1931 to 1935 he was case officer for Communist matters with the Security Section of the Home Department. From November 1935 to late August 1938 he worked with the Search and Locating Section of the rural police: he had the mission to obtain information on Communist and Soviet activities in Bungary and abroad.

From 9 January 1948 he worked with the US intelligence service.

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
