1. SUBJECT; A Character Sketch of SCHENJENNING; shiof of Cornery's Espionage Service.

1. SOMELENNERG's moteorie rise to power, despite the initial handloop of youth and a high party number, has been considered a councehole fort by his admirers as well as by his detractors. In short order he begat three children in bland disregard of his wife's poor state of health. After the last child had been bern- the delivery happendd to be particularly difficult NAPPER RUMBER had to give a direct order to bring SCHELENDERG to his wife's beduide.

13. His rivals, potential and actual, SCHEMINGERG Couplet with incredible pertinacity, single-mindedness and deliberation. In order to gain control over the military espionage system (Abuela) (HELLENER patiently went about gathering incrimination evidence regainst Admired CANARIS and his closest collaborators. 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917. To what extent SCHELLENBERG was actually able to influence HEGT Mate decisions is difficult to guage. Although he was intellectually for superior to HI LELER, his natural inclination not to onso out into the open with his true convictions tended to minimize his influence. SCHELLENDENG had nobody in the world ho could gett him friend. Mhon 19. Regiérungsrat Sebastian, one of his oldest Colonda, has subjected to criminal investigation, SCHELLEMBERG dropped him Like whole petates. All chiefs of the Anter were SCHEALENDERG's sworn energies, equaled by culder of Amt IV who could not forget that SCHEREANNESS at one time had been his subordinate. SCHELLENDENG's collegues were of douche keenly anave of his intellectual superiority. Moreover, they began to real proponderance of SCHELLENBERG's two Amtor (VI and HIL Ant) in the Auth. In the daily meetings of the Ant chiefs, SCHELLENNERG was the built of their most morelloss attacks and frequently he came back to his office like a broken war. even in his own but nobody fully trusted him; with the exception; his faithful secretary Fraulein COHIENKE.

Then when he played KALTENHRUNNER and SKORZENY out against each other with no such skill that he actually got close to bringing about (BORSENT's desurable Quite likely SCHEMELENBERG will claim now that he was a putersaen in his. Ant, a more puppet in the hand of KALTENERUNNER's houshawn WINECE and SKORZENY. That is not true, however, Both believed in direct solid, disregarding channels and banking on CCHELLENMING's notorious distinction to face issue squarely. If he had been loss of a coward, he could have forced both WANECK and SKORZENY into line by the sheer weight of him superior intellect and undoubtedly he would have found the backing of KILTENBRUNNER.

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From the point of view of professional accomplishment, SCHELENHER, much be rated as belonging to the top layer of Germany's Lowling interfluence, and men, in fact, he probably heads the list. As a matter of fact him forth is not intelligence work as such, for which he lacks the practical foundation, but his outstanding brack for organization and importing constructive ideas. SCHELLENEERG has made an exact reduced out of intelligence work. He would be the man to teach this schemed in a university. In spite of the above-mentioned limitations SCHERTENNERG has been most cuccessful in organizing and maintaining his own information not, methody in Switzerland and in Sweden. His lack in practical experience, it means has been amply componsated for by his acumen in judging people and by his judiciousness in dealing with them.

To strike the balance on the various elements that make up SCHELLEHHAR's character:

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Professionally highly gifted, though not devoid of importantions. By all counts, a low character without standards of loyalty and outsion decency. A man who under no circumstances can be trusted.

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
