## DRIGIN Cairo

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SOURCE Paragraphe 1 - 5 from three Moolene with close contents in government circles, two of whom are well acquainted with Arab affairs: Paragraphs 6 and 7 from a source with good contacts in Arab nationalist circles.

1. To visiting Arab leaders the Grand Mufti continues to deplore the sad state of Areb affairs. He talls his listeners to abandon all hope in the Areb League for the defense of the Areb cause in Palestine and electhere, 3-3 pointing out that the League had fulled to take action on Palestine, although this question had been on its agends in October, November and December 1916. Another League failure, according to the Mufti, has been the League's inaction in the Alexandrotta (Hatay) controversy, which had been quistly stricken from its agends by the Secretary-General, in response to a British recommudation.

Amaron Comment: This reference to the Hatay is apparently calculated to appeal to Syria, which appears to be lending support to the Grand Mafti. Prior to returning to his native Syria, Jamil Mardan, forwar Minister to Rappt and now Prime Minister, consulted the Orand Mufti on these matters and pledesd cooperation. It is also reported that upon his arrival in Cairo on 1 January 1967, Riyad Salh, Fremier of Lebenon, called upon the Mufti at his home in Zayton on & January and remained the pledin given to the Muffil by Jamil Mardame

- 2. The Grand Mufti also maintains that the "Greater Syria" project and the proposal for a union of Ireg and Grana-Jordan threaten the existence of B-3 the Arab League. In addition, he points to constant intrigues by Communist agents, the uncompromising attitude of Turkey, and complications presented by the unstable political structure in Lebanon, owing to its large Christian element.
- 3. Because of these undercurrents, the Grand Mufti predicts that the League is doomed to disintegration, in spite of all the best British efforts,-B-3 a contingency which he reliabes with unconcealed jubilation. For this reason he wishes to prepare Areb youth to assume the responsibilities of the Leegue in leading the destinies of the Arab world when the occasion arises. This has brought about his efforts to establish a new League of Arab Mations (See Report No. 30-3170.)

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b. Tracing the origin of the League, the Grand Lufti relates -3 that the project had long remained an Arab dream, which was not fulfilled until the British acceled to its organization in accordance with their consuption, although it had been under consideration by the British since 1922. At that time, they induced the late King Faysal of Iraq to sponsor the project. Faysal dispatched Nuri al-Sa'id from Iraq to Egypt to negotiate with representatives of the late King Fu'ad. Although some progress was made in this direction, the obscure political cutlock of the Egyptian Revolution (Sa'd Zaghlul's period) caused the plan to fail. British policy, however, imposed the Arab League project in 1922 on Hustafa al-Nahhas, then Egyptian Frime Einister, who aspired to the leadership of the Arab world. His discussed from the government and the withdrewal of British support ended his illusions. With the advent of Abd-al-Rahman 'Assen as Secretary-Ceneral of the League, the Arab wave treated to a rule amkening. It then became apparent to their leaders that the League was intended ibr the ultimate designs of British diplomacy.

5. The Grand Hufti also asserts that the Soviet Union and France B-3 disapprove of the conduct of the Arab League because these two nations are convinced that it is a political instrument controlled by the British. As to the U.S., its stand is characterised by evenion. Although America dislices British ascendancy in the Arab world, it cultivates friendly relations and backs the British for temporary expediency. According to the Grand Lufti, the U.S. hopes some day to secure control of the League in order to support American economic and political interests in the Hiddle East, particularly the existing and proposed pipe lines in Palestine and Saudi Arabia.

6.
