

"Variegated radio fare thus furnished is supplemented by additional spiritual sustenance, disseminated by the ubiquitous 'Volkbund fuer das Deutschtum im Ausland' (Folks Union for Germanism Abroad; This organization tills the propagandistic soil of the Latin-Americas with the same zeal it manifested in South Africa prior to September of last year. Its publicistic organs are many, and one of its star contributors is none other than Walter Kappe. Editor of the original Nazi paper published in the United States, he was the first propaganda chief of the 'Teutonia', predecessor of the 'Freunde des Neuen Deutschland' (Friends of the New Germany).

"Herr Kappe is one of those USA Nazis who returned to the Fatherland -- and with Hitlerism in the saddle -- subsequently were promoted in recognition of their devious and diverse 'achievements' on American soil. Of all these careerists, Walter Kappe is at present one of the most influential. Holding an important position at the 'Auslands Institut' (German Institute for Propaganda Abroad), pronouncements penned by him are looked upon as authoritative. It is in this light that his article in the July/August issue of 'Deutschtum im Ausland' (Germanism Abroad) must be considered. As if anticipating Hitler's War, which was not to break out for weeks to come, Kappe writes about 'The White War Overseas'. Hewing true to the mark, he maintains that: 'the campaign of slander against Germany and Germanism abroad reaches all the way from Canada to Patagonia and Africa. Fed anew day after day from thousands of channels, the wave of hatred overflows boundaries and whole continents ... It is not directed only against Germany, but also against Italy, Nationalist Spain, and Japan.'

"Conceivably, Kappe was assigned to write this article because he is regarded as an 'expert' in matters overseas, due to his years in America -- a period which came to an end only because of his promotion to the management of the 'American (North and South) Section' of the 'Auslands Institut'.

"During his American years, Kappe surrounded himself with a number of bodyguards, including such redoubtable USA Nazis as Fritz Gissibl, Hans Strauss and the renegade Nazi, Kurt G. W. Ludecke, author of 'I Knew Hitler'.

"In many of his recent articles, Kappe warns that it would be a mistake to assume that this 'campaign of Hatred has not yielded temporary results for its anti-Nazi originators'. As proof, Kappe enumerates such developments as Brazilian anti-Nazi measures, the Argentine decree limiting the activities of foreign agents, the deportation of the 'DNB' (German News Service) representative from Chile, and others.

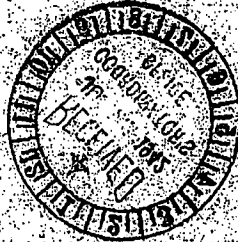
"In the same way in which Dr. Robert Ley manipulates his 'German Labor Front' by remote control, Herr Kappe tills the Latin-American Nazi vineyard. His lodestar obviously is Colin Ross' dictum that the Panama Canal, as 'Jugular Vein of the United States', is of a significance comparable only to that of Great Britain's 'Life Line'. By this token, Nazi efforts in both conti-

ents of the Western Hemisphere are directed towards defeating our foreign policy in the Americas whenever a chance offers itself. Time and again, this has been proven by incriminating material unearthed in raids on swastika headquarters.

Former members of the German-American Bund, who have rendered distinguished service to the cause, have been called to Germany by Hitler and are now employed in these three organizations. Among them is Fritz Kappeler, founder of the first Nazi organization in America (he founded the "Teutonia" in Chicago in 1924); Walter Kopp, the first publicity director of the "Teutonia" and the Bund, later editor of the "Weekend" and several others.
