From the beginning of Antons association with his future wife's fashiy he noted that Olga's father, lavis Mexicons, a merchant in flax seed, was extremely pro-Gorman, such Germin sympathy being consistent with the pro-German feeling of all merchants in the Baltic States whose heritage stamed from the pro-German the Beltic States whose heritage stemmed from the pro-German Hansistic League. Hehn's fether, Antons, being however, quite a nationalist, which was the exact opporite of high's family's feeling, occasionally found himself in differences with her family, but nevertheless menaged to way figa'r two brothers toward Letvien nationalism to such an extent that in later life they became well-known Latvian jatriots who fought against German as well as Lussian oppression and subjugation while participating in the Latvian incependence battles, 1914 - 1918. Furing his days as a member of the fraternity Celonijs -- which at that time was the only social center for college students -- Hahn's father continually propounded Litvian maticalism through anti-German sentiments, and also because an excellent fencer. Territe some of the early opposition by Cige's father to a marriage between Olga and Antons, Olga's family finally consented to such a union and Olga became Antons' wife in 1909. Subsequent to the completion of his studies Hahn's father worked as General Secretary in tion of his studies Hahn's father worked as General Secretary in the firm "Konsuss" in Figs, which delt in srtificial menure and seeds. Then the war broke cut in 1914 there as peared to be a migration of Latviens toward Fuesia, particularly Leningrad, because of an invending German occuration of Latvia. Consequently Hahn's mother and father moved to Leningrad with their children, Margita [17], born 1911, and Invrida [47], born in 1913. After the end of Forld far I in 1913, Antons returned to Latvia and resided on his parents! farm in Vecticias, where Clevland Collaboration on 7 June, 1919. Shortly after this birth, in the same year, Antons moved his family to ligs where he produced a position with the nealy founded Latvian State. Although Hahn Sagurity!

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does not recall all the details of his father's first job with the Letvian State he does remomber that Antons had some kind of position in the Latvian Archives. In 1920 Antons worked in the Ministry of Commerce and Industry as the Tirector of the Commerce Inputation in the Latvian Industry as the Tirector of the Commerce Inputation. Juring this time Sahn's father gained some fame as the organizer of the first Latvian Commercial Exposition in Rige. In that same year Habn's father, along with the first Latvian Foreign Winister, Siegfrids Meierovics, was delegated by the Latvian Government to proceed to Poland where both were to contact Filsudski, from whom they were to request aid for the clearance of the Latvian Province Latgale of all remnants of the Bolshevik Army. The two delegates were successful in this attempt, which paved the way for successful inlish recognition of the Latvian Ritte and close, as well as friendly relations between Latvia and Foland. (Incidentally, Hahn's father wrote a book about this assignment which was destroyed by the Communists in 1940) In 1922 Hahn's father participated in the Bulduri Conference, where an unsuccessful attempt was wade to unify the three Beltic states, Foland, and Pinland. In that same year, 1922, Hahn's father left the aforementioned ministry and became Secretary to the Board of Firectors of the Latvian State Bank. This being a somewhat inactive position, Fehr's father was also a Repertment Chief in this same bank, with which he remained until the Soviet occuration of Latvia in 1940. In the 1920s Hahn's father created the firm "Agronomes", of which he was Executive Lirector, and which dealt in farm supplies. This firm had commetions with Sweden, Jenwark, and England. He remained with this firm until 1930, when it appeared that the firm was about to go into bankruptcy, and in order to avert this the firm was consolidated with "Konsuns" and emerged as the famous farm supply house "Turiba", an Ulanis-supported project.

From 1935 to 1944 Hahn's father also taught Commerce and Economy in the Olav Commercial School in Figs.

Politically Hahn's father was a liberal, which in Latvia meant that he belonged to the so-called "lemocratic Center". Shortly before the Ulmanis "coup d'etat" in 1934, Blochieks, who was the last Latvian Frime Kinister, and who wanted to change the existing cabinet at that time, informed Hahn's father that he would propose him as Minister of Finance or as Ulnister of Commerce and Industry. The aforementioned "coup" eliminated this possibility. Because of his besic belief in the principle of free enterprise and government exclusion from business, Hahn's father was always an out-s,oken anti-Ulmanis individual. Because of an anti-Ulmanis speech which Hahn's father made in Vecpiebalgm

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during the early Ulmania days, and which Ulmania has always hele against him, Antons man not given the insition in the administration of the city of ligs for which Jeneral Baladis, second in command to Ulmania, promosed him. As with most distators, Ulmania attented to inetil a liking for the regime in the school children of that day. This affected Jahn and his states to such an extent that occasional arguments between Hehn and his father arose in their home. In order to seet leade in the family Hahn's father slosly became reserved in his anti-Ulmania attitude until he reached a point where the differences with Imania became quite wild and eventually almost disappeared, though he really never changed his hasic ideas of free entermise. From 1935 until 1940 Hahn's father was Chairman of the latvian Parent Teachers' Association. Through this position he on occasion had the opportunity to talk to Ulmania in person, as a result of which his anti-Ulmania attitude was softened to some extent.

To add to his accomplishments in Letvis Hehn's father also assisted in organizing the YMLA, of which he then became an honorary member.

(2) Turing his early childhood Hahn was a sickly boy and suffered from chronic tonsilitis and some minor heart allment. Because of this, at the age of five his perents sent his to the hig assabore (henceforth referred to as Jurmala) where his mother owned a house. Intil the age of nine Hahn spent his winters with his governess in Jurmala and resided with his Godfather during the summers con his farm in Igukste. In 1927 Hahn entered the Bulduri Grammar School in Jurmala, which he finished in 1933, having been the to; student while attending this school. After an aptitude test which indicated his aptitude in the academic fields, Hahn entered the second higs city high school, which he also completed as the tor student. Turing his highschool days Hahn developed the idea that it was the city life which was so detrimental to his health — though he well realized that his active and enthusiastic participation in sports was asle to some extent the cause for his heart allment, and therefore the idea began to shape in his mind that he would like to choose his carser in the field of agriculture so as to be able to work in the country and "get closer to mother nature". Although his mother and father objected to this Hahn, having passed the Riga University entrance examination as one of the top aspirants, entered this university and began his rtudies in agriculture in 1938. In 1939 the faculty of the Agriculture School was detached from the University of Figs and transferred to the Jelgava Academy of Agriculture. Studying during the winter, Hahn worked on farms in the vicinity of Jelgava during the winter, Hahn worked on farms in the vicinity of Jelgava during the summers, not only to gain practical experience, but also to improve his health. In Jelgava Hahn excelled in agriculture theory but — as a city resident throughout most of his life — he lacked the practical experience, with the result that his accourlishments at the

10. The First Soviet Occuration of Latvia.

(1) On 16 June 1042 the traditional yearly Latvian

National Song Festival was held at Laugavpile, and Mahn attended
it. Turing the celebration the huge throng attending it felt

made his now-famium statement "you must remain in your place as

mational affair in free Latvia. Laugavpile tring very close to
the Latvian-Russian border, was entered by the Fussian forces
very shortly after Mahn's train left for Higs. Upon arrival in
Rigs Mahn was first informed that the Communists had invaded
his homeiand, and it was then that Mahn realized that the
Russian forces practically followed his train. On the 17th of
June the Emssian forces had entered higs and pro-communist elements conducted street demonstrations and engaged in bettles
with the police.

Beeing this Hahn felt as though life had come to an end; he felt be couldn't stand all the political scanes in Riga where all the old ideas of freedom and independence were being destroyed. He consequently proceeded to leave high and went to the village of Krimulda in the vicinity of Sigulda, where he stayed with his older sister for two wonths. It was there that Jurijs Bumeisters, who was travelling about extolling the communist system and their "excellent plan for Latvia", looked up Hahn and knowing Hahn's patriotism, and considering him a friend, advised him to do nothing rash and to be sure and undertake no activity against the new Latvian State. Hahn states this was a very friendly meeting in which Bumeisters desired to help a friend, at the same time telling this friend that not all will be quite as had as he thinks. In this conversation Bumeisters further informed Hahn that the socialist organization to which he belonged had been active in the underground-Ulmanis days, and hence was now very powerful. Bumeisters left with the premise that he would help Hahn as soon as Hahn got over his wild and radical, as well as rash, desires to optose the invaders. In the end of August another student visited Hahn and suggested that Hahn seek employment in the surveying work which was being Come in the country in connection with the Communist Land Feform. Hehn's friend, would not only give Hehn the needed tractical experience, but would also trovide Letvian nationalists a way to sid the appreciast formers, as well as an optoriunity to earn some money. Since dahn, because of the currency reform in which most all Latvians lost their savince, could not expect his precise to may for his achooling, he returned to ligs, procured such a surveying position, and was instructed to proceed to Ekstens, near tests, where he was to work in a surveying test consisting of four Latvians. Upon striving Hehn found that he was the list of the four members, the other three having gotton there before him. Feeling that such work would not proceed without complete Communist control, the other three men naturally assumed that Hehn was the Communist supervisor. Hehn, on the other hand, felt that insmuch as the Communists must certainly give such an important job to at least pro-communist thinkers, these three surveyors must be very profound Communists. Shortly thereafter they all resliged that every one of them was a true Latvian nationalist and found that they were able to sid the farmers so that they did not lose as much land as the Communists had planned. Hehn remained on this job two months, after which time he proceeded to Jelgava in order to continue his studies.

While attending the Academy Mehn resided in the house named by Mrs. Brunelis, who was Festor Kulitis's wife's mother.

In the beginning of the semester Hehn was active in the student chorus group and became assistant to the chorus's director - Medins. A celebration hersiding the opening of a new school year, as well as era for Latvia, was organized. The principle speaker at this affair was the head of the communist-deminted Latvian Government, Kirchensteins. The student chorus group was scheduled to open the ceremony by singing the International. However when the time arrived it was found that the lirector, Wedins, was absent. Consequently Medins' son took it upon himself to lead the chorus and when the International was to be sung it was found that only a few voices were heard, one of which was Hehn's. Seeing that the greater majority of the chorus did not sing, these few voices also subsided.

The MKY: investigated this incident, with no redical results following. Hehn, however, was removed from the position of Administrative Assistant and Medins, who claimed to be ill that day, was interrogated at length and was completely inactive for a short while thereafter.

Fith the beginning of this school year behn began to toy with the idea that some resistance to the present occupying regime should be initiated. Prequent travel from Jelgava to

In the beginning of 1941 Greate was varned that the MKVI was looking for him, and though he hid for a period of two months he couldn't resist visiting his recent bride in Lielwards, where he was apprehended. Hahn assumes that Kirsis must have had a very good alibi because even though the NKVI was looking for Greate for two months Kirsis was not errested and continued to live in the same apartment that he had previously shared with Greate. Hahn's assumption regarding Kirsis' alibi is strengthened in that during the aforementioned two months prior to Greate's arrest the apartment was a trap for anyone attempting to enter it. However later, after Greate was arrested he must have revealed Kirsis' complicity in the affair because scortly thereafter Kirsis too was arrested. Kirsis' wother was also arrested by the NKVI in Jelgava an not being able to stand the torture and finding an opportune moment in the toilet in the Jelgava jail she committed suicide by hanging herself. Keither Greate nor Kirsis have ever been heard of since. One of the aforementioned persons caught in the trap was CATSEYF, who was visiting Greate's father, but did not belong or have any connection with the group or any of its activities. CATSEYE was held for two days, interrogated, and then releaset.

In the Fall of 1940 Hahn informed hir risters of his underground activities for the surpose of procuring their aid in hiding persons working for the illegal newspaper, to report on local situations, and to sic him with funds. At that time Hargita, the older, was a teacher in the French lyceum in Riga, while Ingrida, the younger, was a teacher in the Jaunjalgava's School of Commercy. Even though his sisters were skeptical about the usefulness of Hahn's activities, and even though they showed some hesitancy in approving, they nevertheless gave their wholehearted support to him whenever he requested it.

As far as lishe could determine there was no definite goal that this underground organization had, nor was he knowledgeable of any contact with any foreign intelligence service. He believes that it was hastily organized by a few students and officers with the intention that when it became a going concern they would then decide as to what to do, being guided by the consibilities and situation at that time.

- (3) Hahn's fither, who at that time var vitheut a job, and not knowing any of Hehn's true activities, believed that Hahn was really a Communist. This helief was also held by many other friends, acquaintances, and relatives, some of whom still feel today that ishn was no atrengly involved with the Commies. Juring: New Year's party, celebrating the errival of the Year 1941, which was held in the home of Mrs. Janson 107, Hahn's Godmother, and which was attended by the Hahn family, Professor Birkhans 117, Judge Teikmans 127, Irugist Cerbulis 117, and some others whom Mahn cannot recall now, Hahn's father, who arrarently did not want to differ with his son who was so openly a Communist, made the statement that the present regime was really not so had after all; "a person can work, can live, and can breath". All others present were quite surprised and dejected about this statement because they considered Hahn's father an authority in politics, a staunch supporter of freedom, and a person who had never talked that way before. Hahn, who realized the true reason for his father's utterings, felt it his duty to inform his father about his true activities. The father was somewhat alarmed about Hahn's safety and facred that he would take a bad ond. Nevertheless he occasionally cided Hahn in his illegal activities. His father agreed that openly anti-Communistic sympathies should not be shown —— on the contrary one should rlay along with the Communists while in public, but his father was certain that this double life which his son was leading was a little too much for his frail boy.
- (4) In the beginning of 1941 Eahn had a chance to climb even higher in the ranks of Communists at the Academy in Jelgave. This occurred when Komisors (abbreviation for Academy Communist Young Organizer) Favils Vipers /14/, son of Professor Vipers, found, that because of his work load he could not function in two positions at the same time, i.e., Vipers was not only Komisors, but was Chairman of the Academy Culture Committee, of which Hahn was a member. Giving Hahn the position of Chairman of the Culture Committee, which Vipers was forced to vacate, the latter told Hahn that that is as high as Hahn would ever be able to go in the Communist ranks because of Hahn's parents previous high social standing (they caned's house, etc.). Hahn's reaction to this at that time was that Vipers hadn't been doing too badly, being the son of a university professor.

- (5) Through Hahn's friend Janis Jeksbachs 12/, now in Australia, who lived in the same residence as Vipers, Hahn, who later added Jeksbachs to his group, had an opportunity to receive reports of Vipers statements which the later often made at home. According to Jeksbach, Vipers had often expressed himself, saying that the political activities in the Academy were quite an easy task for him -- all he had to do was pound his fist on the table and even the old underground members from Letgale were scared into inactivity.
- (At this point an inconsistency in Benn's negretive was noted in that he had previously stated that he had been given the position of Chairman of the Culture Committee activities because Vipers was overworked; on the other hand at this point it argears that Vipers really considered his work at the University to be a task he could successfully accouplish with great ease. Hahn could not explain this discrepancy and brushed it eside by saying that possibly it was Vipers' lussian soul and moodiness which caused him to have made two contradictory statements, one directly to Hahn and the other to Jekabsons -- of course not knowing that Jekabson would tell Hahn.)
- (6) It should be noted here that Hahn believes Vipers to be a very clever, shread, and intelligent person. In part this is evidenced by the fact that prior to 1940 the faculty at the Jelgeva Academy had often stated that Vipers was the most intelligent student that they had ever seen. Incidentally, Vipers was always the first student in his class.

In order to camouflage his true aims still further, Hahn organized the Atheist Section at the Jelgava / cadewy. He undertook this task because such a section -- according to the Communist order -- within a body of higher learning was deemed of privary importance, and because such a section had not been formed until that time Hahn felt that another opportunity had presented itself. Furthermore Hahn felt that one Communist position more or less meant little and that there possibly would be no work attached to this. This assumption was quite correct, Hahn was given this position and did virtually nothing for a long period of time. In order to avert suspicion hahn wrote one atheist article in "Lengales Homunists". This article was read by Fastor Kulitis, who lived in the same apertoent building as Hahn, and having read this article told Hahn that a such articles should never be written and that the way that Hahn has expressed himself was quite contrary to the truth. This article created a great deal of opposition to Hahn smong those who lived in the same apertment house and who knew Hahn. A fellow student who knew the true circumstances regarding Hahn's activities informed the apartment house superintendent of Hahn's true activities; she in turn further informed Kulitis

with the result that the housekeeper and hulitis were from then on favorably motivated toward Hahm. After he had served a while as the organizer of the Atheist Section, Eath are maked may be had accomplished nothing during his term of office. His reply was that he maither had suspenters nor was there any interest among the students, which resulted in his loing removed from this position.

(7) Since in a routine personnel questionmaire Hahn had declared that his other owned a house at the beach, his scholarship was rescinced, forcing Hahn to work evenings for "Geklu Lkaports" (seed export) as a leboror carrying seed bags.

Twenty to thirty Academy students who had also lost scholarshine because of either too high social standing or because their families had been members of Aigssergi, or for other reasons, were also forced to seek this type of spere time employment with the aforementioned company. Toward the end of the school year Hahn's "visible reform" which was evidenced by his excellent performance as Chairman of the Culture Commission, resulted in the procurement of the notation as bookkeeper for the University kitchen. This enabled taken to disgard his job as physical laboror and to get free meals at the Academy kitchen.

(8) In the end of January 1941 Hahn, as one of eighty students from all over Latvis, went to Sigulds, where a winter rest cast for pro-communist students and college activities was located. The head of this cast, which was located in the Paketniels fils (outhor's castle) was a Talcis 77. According to Hann'there were some cases of students who were permitted to attend this rest cast on scholastic merit, but those were very few and the cast was always considered as a cast for Communist sympathizers. Hahn and his friend, Janis Jekobsons, were permitted to take advantage of a two week rest period in this cast when the recommendation of Virpers. In this cast Hahn had a chance to acquaint hispath with many leading young Communists such as Vera Kacens 187, who was a colitical organizer at the University of Higs, another organizer being (ilderwanis 197) (not present in this cast), Uldis Fredeus 207, FMI Sapiro 217, Illa Hanina 227, Stanishave Buls 237, Sekabs Grauzis, Jasepa Lipakis 247, isvils Vinpers, A. Although Hann was not certain of what this visit souls bring he took all nonemarry precentions by informing the co-workers that he must visit the VAVI and that the resultility may exist that they may force him to become an informant. Helm's frience advised him with your reluctancy that if such a job were offered to him that he take it. At home he told tre. Fruncal, the apertment house supervisor and theer, that she was to burn all inment nouse supervisor and owner, that she was to turn all in-eriminating evidence if he did not return within two hours. He later found that she, fearing the worst, burned everything immediately after he had left. Unon arrival at the city half high found the Chairman of the Executive Committee awaiting him. After some preliminary questions to Chairman informed Hahn that he had a job for nim which would enable him to make some extra money. This job consisted of taking inventory of all teytile stores in Jelgava, this being in accordance with the metionalistic trogram. The interview was curt and brief and ended with the Chairman's instruction that Hehn weit for a while. Hahn was conducted to a room where he vaited all alone for a short reried of time. Then the rock was entered by an individual who Hahn later found was the Chief of the Jelgava NKVI, FMI Melnikova All; Welnikova sat down in a corner of the room and said nothing for a prolonged period of the contact the book was warm unconferrable. The alone ner of the room and said nothing for a prolonged period of time, during which Hehn became very uncomfortable. Then slowly Melnikova began his interrogation, which lasted for three hours with the end result that Melnikova did not like two points re-garding Hahn. -- (a) Hahn's activities within the Mazpulks (the Latvian 4H Club), and (b) Hahn's connection with the fra-ternity Celonija. Having consisted himself to nothing Helnikova Hahn was forced to wait for half on hour and passed this time by attem ting to gain some knowledge of his fate through listening to the subdued conversations next door. In this atteart he was not successful. Then Melnikova returned he informed Take that he could go, to which lishe reflied that he
desired to know whether he could have the job. Melnikova
answered curtly and in the true of "go away little boy, you
bother sem and said myou will be notified later".

after this episode Hahn felt that he now had to be more careful because he was known to the  $\it MXYV$  . Through

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Jekabson Hahn found that Virbers was knowledgeable of his talk with Polnikove.

- (10) In rebruary 10, 1941, during a verrly University celebration, Each set Vilouary, who was at that time serving in the motorcycle unit territorial group (the name for the Jussian-controlled Latvian army) and was stationed in Bloks. Hahn had known Valdemars as a former student from high school days and hense, feeling secure enough, approached Valdemars with the promosition that he join his underground group. Although Valdemars felt a bit uncertain about joining because of a small unplement incident on 18 June (Latvian Independence 199) in Bloks, he nevertheless agreed to join and informed Hahn that the unit in which he served was an extrarely nationalistly motivated group and would no doubt never fight for the Communists. Since Valdemars frequently travelled to ligs on duty, a way for Mahn to contact Valdemars in ligs through Hahn's friends was arranged. After Valdemars inined the group he was caught APOL for two hours and sent to a corrective camp which was stationed at times on the Latvian side of the Latvian-Jussian border, and a times on the Pussian side, the last location of this unit in 1941 having been in Faplaks.
- (11) In March and Arril 1941 a large number of persons, including some of Hahn's fellow constitutors, were arrested. Resides Kirsis, Kreslins, and Jansons, also arrested were Edvins Eumanis 127, and Hugo Vergs, 117.

One girl who was knowledgeable of Hehn's participation in the underground was arrested in Figs and was questioned under torture. Later, when released, the girl informed her sister in Jelgava, who was the of Hahn's co-workers, that even though she had revealed nothing about mahn to the MAV; that his name was known to them and that he best be extremely cautious.

At the same time FNN Vanaga arrived at the Academy in Jelgava and warned the students there that Wahn was a Communist; he nade the same statement regarding Main's sister who was at that time attenting the French Lyceum in Figs. Vanaga cautioned all to be very careful of Hahn, who, having heard from Kreelins that Vanaga was a Communist, began to believe that this was some act of provocation.

"(12) Just trior to the end of April 1941, Oscars
Fitnevice introduced Lahn to another group so as to be able to
utilize hann's capabilities more fully, because practically all
members of the group Lahn had been working with had been arrested
or had been compromised. Fitnevice introduced Hahn to Janis
Vanage 147, who requested Mahn to organize surport noints on

the Latvian-Lithuanian border, which were to be utilized by persons crossing Lithuania on their way from Germany to Latvia and vice verse.

In accordance with Vanaget species Balm organized three support coints on the Lithuania-Latvian border, in the districts of Jerkone, Eucava, and Ealetu. These support coints consisted of farm houses, paroles, and lines which would lead a possible infiltree or exfiltree to or from Hahm in Jelgava. From there Hahm had arranged lines which would lead to or from Vanage in Figs.

In the end of .:ril 1941 Vanage informed can'n that some clands time .ctivity of his group in ligs on the left side of the laurava, had been discovered, had resulted in a shooting, and that twenty persons from this group were caught. I ue to this Vanage advised Bahn to take cover. It was at this time that Hahn found that the leaser of this group was likerd, who along with Vanage, had managed to escape during this shooting.

- (13) About the same time Hann's older sister arrived in Jelgava with the advice that Hann better be careful since the EKVI had come to their assistant and even though they had indicated they were looking for someone else, she was sure that they were using that as an excuse and that they were really attempting to fine Hahn.
- (14) Because of the previously-described series of alarms, Hahn began to feel very unsafe toward the end of April 1941, and began spending many nights away from home, staying on such occasions with friends. He finally decided to leave the Jelgave Academy.

In the very last days of Arril 1941 Hehn was autroached by a female member of the Academy chorus who Hehn had always thought quite pro-Communist. This girl then quite openly informed Hehn: "Comrede (Hehn) you will be arrested". Hehn, thinking this some sort of provocation, assumed the usual line and with great importance asked this girl whether she realised with whom she was speaking (meaning of course, that he was the Chairman of the Culture Committee, etc.). Nevertheless this girl stated that her boyfriend was in the militia in Jelgave, where he saw a warrant for Hehn's arrest. The reason for this arrest, according to the girl, was the fact that illegal meetings were held and mationalistic songs were sung in Hehn's apartment. Hehn obtained this information in the course of an Academy party, which was the last Academy function that he strended. Not desiring to show any fear or emotion, Hehn stayed until the end of the ball, slept that night with friends, and in the morning checked with the Janitor of his apartment building to determine if anyone had come to look for him, and found that such was not the case.

Just one week before the hall -- as lishs began to feel more and more undertain because of the aforementioned incidents -- he had asked the chief of the communist-sponsored students' professional organization, A. Jekans 157, for a reference about his work in the academy. Eahn sought this reference tecause he felt he needed a job to fell back upon in ogen to ever had to abandon his location and seek cover. Hence, having procured this reference, he approached the Agriculture Commissariat, where he contacted the Fersonnel Chief, PRU Stein 16, with the request that he be given a job in his field. In this fashion lights procured employment at the foil and Vegetation besearch and Experimental Station in Feternieki, 13 kilometers northeast of Jelgava.

On the morning after the ball -- having found that he was not being looked for -- habn went to the Voyenkomat where he registered that he was leaving Jelgava and proceeding to his place of employment in reterriski.

(15) The chief of this exterimental station, Professor FNU Konrad, as well as no to other employees, believed Hann to be a Communist chaesver because Stein had sent with Hahn an order to the Professor that mann is to be employed by the station. Iteplite the fact that everyone at the station disliked him, dahn found that his position was very good in that he could not only continue his clandestine activities, but also had the opportunity to do a great deal of travelling, which his job at the station called for. Several times after he returned from some business trip or other -- having on the sice also accomplished some of his underground work -- he was informed by Professor Konrad that some NKVI people had been looking for him. Such visits strengthened that the persons who had come to visit Hahn were his buddies from the NKVI.

In the beginning of 'ay 1941 itrevice' introduced mahn to a new underground organization whose lender was Indulis Grosskopfs/18/, who it later developed, had connections with Kirsis' group which consisted of members of the liga University Fiding Club. The assignment that Grosskopfs gave to Hahn consisted of spreading written instructions to Letvian farmers, as well as other rural inhabitants so that they would know how to protect themselves from thefts, and other acts of violence in time of was. Even though this is an act of self-preservation which would come naturally, it was felt that these instructions were needed because of the rossibility that was may spread penic and no one would really know what to do. At that very time Gross-kopfs was gwaiting the second part of these instructions, i.e. instructions pertaining to sabotage and armed resistance, which he was expecting daily to arrive from Germany. On a pre-arranged

Nowhere in the residence could main find the aforementioned first helf of the instructions though he did find all the paper upon which they were to be crimted, and taking this reper lished left the apartment heare. Turing this night Hahn was in Liepaja, having just come from one of the asfehouses on the Lithuanian—Latvian border. The owner of this house was also deported during this night, after behn left. Hahn stayed with his Godfather in Liepaja during this might and though they arrested a nertdoor family, neither Hahn nor his Godfather; the famous Latvian petriot, Janis Megciems, were disturbed. The following morning Hahn returned to liga where he checked to see whether his carents were deported and found them alive and well. After that he returned to his experimental station and remained there without contacting anyone until the breaking out of hostilities between Fussia and Germany.

On the following day the Germans began to bomb Fussian units on the liga-Jelgava road. Having the first indication that was had begun Hahn proceeded to the eforementiated safehouse with Janis Leja, whom he recruited as an aid and who had been working at the same experimental station. At the house Hahn and Leja found that the inhabitants were not knowledgeable of the parole and therefore halm and Leja Left. This group also sided the local population in setting up recurity forces, as the group itself was too small to cover a large arms, and since remnants of the Communist army which had turned into kangs of robbers and cutthroats were terrifying the countryside. 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(2) The Parkonkrusts, which during the very early days of the German occupation, was the leading indigenous element in Latvis, made the following request of the populations

That persons register in the following categories --

- Category A Those remains who had been members of the Ferkonkrunts prior to 1940.
- Category R Those jetsons (who wished to register) who had worked in the anti-communist underground during 1940-41 under the leadership and guidance of the Perkonkrusts or its members, yet who had never been members of the Perkonkrusts.
- Category C Those persons who wished to join this organization but who had never been members nor who had never participated in underground activities sponsored or led by the Perkonkrusts organization.

All of this registering was obviously voluntary and was carried out with the intention that having been the pro-German faction prior to 1940 the Ferkonkrusts would now become the Latvian puppet government under the leadership of Coloins, yet under the complete direction of the German occupying authorities. Hahn, as a well-qualified reman, joined the aforementioned category B, not because if political concurrence, but rather because he believed that well-qualified non with good intentions belonged to it.

(3) The registration, as sutlined above, having been completed in the very early days of the German occuration, two very definite groups appeared to take shape within the Perkon-krusts: (A) Sondergruppe F (likerd) -- the assignment of this group was to invertigate all Communists affairs, locate remaining Communists, and press prosecution. This group could be considered a type of internal political security police. The results of the investigations conducted by this group were turned over to the German authorities, who prosecuted colitical offenders. It later developed -- and Hahn thought this odd -- that in addition to investigating Communists and persons suspected

of Communist sym athles, the I group also investigated former, as well as present political encaies of which the former interrity were members of the demission Davientha (farmers! by the German authorities. This act eliminated the necessity for a chief of the Perkonkrusta and therefore saused Colmina to leave the position as chief of the entire accordance. Shortly thereafte of Colmina and his secretary, Failus Sivine, merved on the staff of sectors. Owners Dankers, 765%, in ignome third of a Latvian quintling government (General Direktion des Intern).

Despite the fact that the Ferral Protects was concritent, and hence Clemina was not the leader, he still had an indirect contact as while as some limited furiabilition over the R group because the Personaruate continues to exist illegally supported by its former numbers, nost of them worked for Risards. Consequently Colmins was very knowledgeable of most all of the activities of Risards group.

As most outstanding H remembers the case of the former Latvian Supreme Court Justice Jania Arkrava/66/, who had been forced by the HEVD to become an informant. The remain that this case is so interesting in H's memory is the fact that H knew ARKHA75 family personally, because Ankrava was such a highly placed person in the pre-war Latvian Judicial system because Ankrava bimself freely admitted cooperation with the HEVD, and because Ankrava waste a long, detailed parrative regarding his HEVD recruitment, meeting, and activities.
- (11) In the very end of 1941 Rikards received a lot of complaints, particulary from the Jelgava area, regarding H's pro-communist # activities during the previous Ressian occupation; these complaints were not primarily based on personal prejudices but rather expressed the fear that H may have infiltrated the Rikard group as a true Communist. In a meeting with Rikard H found that Rikard was quite impoleograble of H's true purpose and activities and addised h that it

was not recessary for the latter to imme in writing or by documentary evidence any of his former activities. At that came time His former Aradesy

There H talked to one of Metra's assistants Peters Cimals to whom H expressed willingness to write a complete report outlingne not only his activities at the Academy during the Communist occupation, but also the activities, names, and other data about other Communists known to him. Cimals expressed regret that H did not do this in the very first few days after the Russian retreat and stated that at this time the entire matter was melf-evident to the political authorities and there was no need for H to write such a report.

Motra, incidentally, was a secret informant for kikard.

(12) After working about a month in the investigations sub-section, if became to feel that his warm had little if any importance and would not lead him to his ultimate roal, the active fight with Communism. This feel-ing developed when he realised that all the persons he was interrogating were or had been small frys in the Communist machine; he also felt that his lack of experience in interrogations was the cause of his personal reprehension, and that this lack of experience also caused him to believe most all of the information eliciated during such interrogations, which

As the German occupation of His country progressed toward the German supressed and, the occupying authorities legan to ensure in various anti-Latvian activities, making H realise that this is not a case of friendly coordinate achieve the destruction of Commission, but rather that a new energy has arrived intent on destroying Latvian nationalism. Despite realiging that it is no doubt this monstrous German force along which could destroy H's arch enemy, nevertheless H and neveral other nationalistically inclined friends began to think that they were duty bound to insure the re-creation of the Latvia: state if and when Communism were destroyed. Momentarily that entailed preservation of nationalism and nationalistic institutions which the Germans with all hante were in the process of destroying. So that such anti-Latvian acts by recorded H and Mitrovics began to write down and collect all such acts including changes in street mames, high tame, German privileges, particularly those oncerning food, etc. Since H had numerous friends, particularly to Jeleva the collection of such German activities was not difficult and resulted in a steady flow of such reports.

An excellent orportunity to enhance this activity of H's presented itself when Rikard personally tailed with H and requested that he accept an assignment to work for the SD. Rikard explained to H that in this position H would have to check various explications of latvians applying for positions with the German occuping a propities, for telephones, etc.

Ribard further explained the M's true air would be to miscree the inner working of the SD as well as the plane and intertions in latvic. It was then that H was informed that Martine Balodie was already assigned to the SD and working in the mane overtion well as convert capacities; H with his excellent German language qualifications was to replace Balodie, who could not handle this language. Balodie was therefore recalled to his original assignment in Ribardie cross. H accepted and was assigned to SD, Abteilung III, and worked in its card file section. The chief of Abteilung III was Captain Lieurang M's immediate supervisor, the chief of the card file section, was Spt. Fritz Orign of Westfalia, whose assistant was Spt. Coltx of Bavarix. (It was Coltx who later arrested H.)

- (13) As this information that Bahn was receiving assumed very voluminous proportions, enabling him to write extremely landthly hisweetly reports, Mitrovice thought it a good idea to exempt such covert information from these reports that would be of interest to the German authorities and supply them with a similar bessetly report. Behind all this was Mitrovists idea that if sufficient interest in such a resolute were aroused in the German authorities it could give Mitrovies the opportunit; to form an information section attached to Rikard's group. - (14) As the gathering of such information progressed successfully, further compilations were made of such items as foreign broadcasts, particularly those of the BBC and rame American broadcasts, current and anti-German jokes and puns, and rumnre.

Returning to Riga is found that the now favour break between Celmins and Rikards had occurred. The reason for this break was that Rikards, Adolfs Schilds, Evalds Andersons, and Dimusto Pikais disagreed with the a trensky pro-Cerman line Celmins was taking. This break, which occurred on the initiati e of the above mentioned person created no changes with in the pirutture of Rikard's group or any of its workings; the only effect it had was that those persons siding with Rikard's siems could really not be considered any more as members of the Perkonkrusts, but rather as plain employees in the Rikard's group, and Rikards personal supporters.

In the fall of 1942 B got acquainted with a Latvier religious sect Dievturi) which propounded a nationalistic Latvian religion based upon the arctional Latvian Gods. The leader of this sect was Ernests Brastins/87/. Bath was just in contact with this sect by Mastins Balodis and Jekabs Sildega (both numbers of Rikards organization).

Bahn slowly got to know several of the adherents to this religion and was eventually informed that within this religious sent there existed any underground organization, to which many former Latvian army officers belonged, who were serving at the time in the police force in Rigs, (It should be noted that not all of those persons belonging to the underground organization were necessarily followers of this religious movements,)
One of the leaders of this underground group was a number of the Riga criminal police, fun Marzargi. Bahn was informed that this underground was quite interested in procuring his as well as Mitrovies' services; however, talking it over with Mitrovies, he and Mahn decided not to join because they could not determine the entire structure of the organization, or any of its aims. In the end of 1942 the German authorities discovered this activity and arrested a large number of policemen, thereby disbutting

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this underground movement.

Also in the end of 1942 file it could clearly be seen that the German authorities epigeed and were striving to destroy all Labvian nationalism and any of the organizations and supporters by at first beginning to arrest some members of Rikards group as while as the nationalist organization Tautas Bales (Voice of the People), whose chief was four Caupals, (of this organization the Germans arrested its leader and some 200 numbers).

Shortly thereafter they also arrested let Lt. Parsons and Arture Reparts, who were both accused of appling for the British.

(16) In the very end of 1922 an article appeared in Habn's covert bi-weekly summary describing Celmins' activities in Berlin prior to the outbreak of the war.

Celmins, who was very resturbed shout this article aimon it described him as heving had a good time and led a soft life rather than owncern bimself with precein; national problems, requested that Hitrevica reveal the source therefo. Hitrevica refused to reveal such information because it had been clearly understood before, that the work of the Hikard group, and the organization Perkonkrists were two separate, divorced matters, whereupon Hitrevice was expelled from the organization by Jelmins. This act caused Bahn, Teodors Jansons, and Dames Raudeins to hard in their resignations from the Perkonkrists, which were however, not accepted by Gelmins.

At this same time a disagreement arose between Rikards and Greble, the reason for it being that the German authorities had requested that approximately 20 members of the Rikard group be assigned to anti-Communist activities in Russia. Greble opposed this idea because he felt that no Latvian should leave homeland, and therefore he, and approximately ten of his friends and surporters, quitathe organization. With Greble's departure and with the lift between Rikard and Colmins, Ritrevice between one of the leading personalities in the organization and was able to influence Rikards to the extent that Rikards began to realize the need for a new actionalistic base to his work and consented to create the aforementioned information senter which later coordinated the activities of all covert informer whose reports, up to that time had been utilized in

However it was soon found that he paid very particular attention to the informations section and requested Kitsevics to furnish him the names of all sources of information, which Mitrevice refused to do. Mitrevius based tids refulal upon the fact that when recruited the sources were promised anomacity. Immediately after this visit preparations were made so notify all sources to discontinue their reporting, in case any reproductions from the German side were to appears preparations were also made to him all existing convent records if such need arose. It must be noted that a certain feeling of expectancy existed. Eahn and Storphorgs then prepared a lengthy essay entitled "German Latvian Salations" which deniete numerous anth-Latvian acts by the Germans and which contained a warming that if such conditions were to continue, an open and possibly armed conflict between the German compying authorities and the Latvian population may occur. Though this was far from being a diplomatically worded document, Mahn feels that it was the best that he has ever written because it showed the conditions as they truly were. This document was given to Rimmy whom circumventing his next step in the chain of command, win the 50trenematted it directly to save highly placed persons in Serlin. The first such arrest was held in Riga in Valdamare residence and was attended by his university classmates as well as by the dean of the Riga university, Ermesta Magobada /66/, who warmed against taking drastic measures. The second speech was held in the Academy in JEMCAVA where he spoke to former (Russian occupation) underground members. This speech basically was of the same nature as the first, however in it Hahn stressed the necessity for restisting the German ideas of colonization and subjugation. His intention with this group was to draw it closer to himself and hitriation so as to reactify the former, extensive underground.

The only non-underground number who attended H's second lecture was farm machinery lecturery Janis Abblins, who was asked by H's frédrie to attend because they considered him as the most promising young Latvian Lecturer. (19) By this time Alfreds VALHARIS had surpressed his competitor Gustava
Colmins and emerged as the indigenous Latvian leader who, though sponsored and supportsed by the Germans, did occasionally, fults openly, opposed them; such opposition however, was tolerated by the cocupiers because of this there now seems to be a devided opinion among influential and prominent Latvians regarding VALDARISIS: some

dain that his opposition was gentine and he was not removed because the Germans feared representations from the population who in general favored VALDHANIS; others maintain that this opposition was instigated by the Germans themselves who desired that the population rally around a Latvian leader whom they could dontrol because of his pro-German sentiments.

Since, at that thee, Valdmania represented the most acceptable political line, Mitrovice, with Mixards consent, contacted him so as to rid the Mixards group of the undesirable PERCONERGIST constation and togain a new, nationalization basis for further activities. This contact resulted in an agreement that Mixards group would exchange and its information - including occupations—while Valdmania would furnish all litest decisions and transcripts from and accounts of the independence governing body. From this meeting Mitrovice retains of the i pression that Valdmania was an unusually able individual who excelled in politics and was undoubtely a thorough nationals.

It is noteworthy to aid that after the war, when Hahn was contacted by British Int. service representative George Rilgour, Hahn was informed that in the latter part of the war British Intelligence representatives in Germany were in contact with Faldmanis.

In order that a Latvian political center be created, Mitrevice, felt that it was necessary to contact Bruno Ealnims/89/who was an important leader of the social democrate. The initial contact was assigned to Mahn who contemplated undertaking it through furis Sundistore, This meeting which actually never occurred, had already been arranged, the purpose behind it being to determine if Ealnims wished to participate in such a unification.

- (21) Pertaining to Hahn's personal life, it should be noted that at this particular time on 28 Feb. 43) he asked Tamara Dancesfor her hand and, having secsived a few rable reply, planned in accordance with existing mustoms to produce her parents blessing on 6 March 1943 on day he intended to become officially engaged. These personnal as well as his other plans were interrupted on the early morning hours of 6 March when Hahn was arrested by 50 Sgt. OCLTZ, his former immediate supervisor.

This obviousely, was incorrect, though there was some question regarding payment of wages and advances which was the restonsibility of the chief of the Administrative, support, and Finance section; these charges a maint Pestersons apparently were correct, for later he seems to have repayed a certain sum. In the fall of 1963 there occurred a reor animation of the Valmiera jail which brought about the following changes:

a. All communist immates were transferred to the concentration camp in SALASPILS on 28 Sept 1943 leaving in Valuation only information

It is noteworthy that Colmins was publishing this paper not so such to oppose the Germans in a classicatine manner as to insure himself -- sensing Germany's defeat -- the possibility of claiming opposition to the German regime. This is easily evidenced by the fact that when his coworkers from the rural areas arrived at his office, they were given a stack of newspapers which when leaving they quite openly carried under their arm. It was later found that the Germans who began to suspect Colmins had photographed some individuals leaving his office with a stock of "Briva Latvie" complementally under their arm.

Shortly after his release Hehn carried out his previously planued persomel affairs by becoming engaged to his present wife who was at that time working as a destist in Maune. Though Rahm's wife's mether opposed an early marriage, Mahm, who was ordered to appear for military service on 3 March 1964, was married by the civil authorities on 2 March 1944. On the appropriate day Hahn appeared before the Latvien Legion medier! beard who declared him unfit for military service because of heart trouble. In accordance with existing preendures. Mahn, having been found unfit for active service, was assigned to Palice daty in Rice and was actually employed by the Police Department. At first Hahm was assigned to the 7th precinct whose chief was police Capt. Rokis. Make's duties were these of an ordinary petrolman pounding a cost. Insamuch as the police was at that time very unpopular Hahn applied for the position of interpreter for the police. Having passed a test in German proficienty he was given such a position and assigned as interpreter to the lith police preciset. As customery, Mahn's civil marriage was followed by a regular church wolding which took place in Rige's St. John's church on 9 April 19th and was performed by poster A. Mitulis. The wedding and reception was also attended by all of his former Valutare jail fallow immetes who had by that time been released.

In June 1964 Eahn began to think about the edvice of lesturer Abolius, 1.0. that he should form a stay-behind group could be the beaute of the heavy losses sustained by the Latvian Lagran on the Russian front and because a collapse of this front sessed imminent. Hahn discussed this with Valdemar who was assigned to the Hq. of the Latvian Legion. Valdemar, who my virtue of his assignment had access to fectual military information, thought Mahn's idea preiseworthy and advised that in his opinion many Latvian Legion soldiers would take to the woods without hesitation because they too saw the inevitable German defect and retreat from Latvia, which then would again be eccupied by the Russians.

(26.) In the very end of July 1966 the Ressian forces, which were advancing eastward through Lithuania, sent a surprising bridgehead toward Jelgava, capturing that city and preceeding to Tukume which was also captured. The element of surprise caught the Germans off guard and thus encoled the Ressians to cut off any German retreat through the two Euroeme ports Liopaja and Ventspile. However, the Germans and many Letvians, flighting completely independently, meneged to rally, contain this drive, and eventually push this spearhead out of Tukume, thus Couring an avenue of retreat for the German forces; the Ressian forces were at that time firmly entremed in Jelgava and vicinity where some finree fighting took place. However, meither the Latvians nor the Germans could push this force out of Jelgava which from them on remained in Ressian hands.

This inscient advence, as well as German disinterest to hold Latvia (which was indicated by the heavy and penicky attempts on the part of a number of highly placed officials to flee to Vermany). enhanced Make's efforts to organize a stay-behind group. Make accomplished this in the following manner:

Just prior to the aferementioned spearheads entrance into Intvis, the German authorities permitted the Letvison to remov the "Aissargi" (home guard) which had been outlawed since 1960 by the Raddingings ppalling the Germans. In qualicipation of a Russian fifth column, all numbers of the Aiguargi were assigned

to the various police precincts. T. Jameons and himmus, of a had in the seamtime joined the Aissargi, were assigned to the lith police precinct where to their surprise they found Hahn at work. Hann then related him stay-behind idea to Jameons, who wrote it up in a proposal form and passed it on to hickards. The latter t of this proposal to it. Col. Desnitis /93/ Chief of the Aissargi, who felt that such stay-behind unit -- which Hahn samed "Anti-Bolshevic Partisan Hq" (FPC) -- would become detrimental to the Aissargi insermed as such a group would start its activities by armed resistance to the Germans causing them to outlaw the Aissargi. Nevertheless, upon the invitence of Eikards, Desnitis economical, with the provision that the PPS would operate clandestinely as an integral part of the Rige Aissargi Engineets, Communications unttalions, special assignment group. Armed with this promise the rPS organ to form small stay-behind groups in the

conter informed), arms, and emplosive; trained, radio appreture-were furnished

to the small groups from the reservoir of Latvians who readily placed themselves at the disposal of the FFS. The location of such radio operators as well as the assembling of the sets themselves which were received from the 212th Comb. Int. group in parts, was accomplished by Aleksanders Amentins /95/. Wecause of the sensitivity of his assignment, the Germans kept Akaemins under very strict control which he theroughly disliked and as a result, later, went into hiding.

In order to seek further sid in its stay-behind activities, the MTO contacted the Hq. of the latvian Legion, where Cu, wen. Rudolfs Hangerskis, however, was not feverably inclined, whereas one of mangerskis aids, Col. Silgellis was sympathetic and officially gave two persons from Hq. leave with covert instructions that they are assigned to the PPU. In manner homens Starnbergs and Valdesar began their activity in the formation of the provincial stay-behind units.

Also active in the formation of these units were kenerts Krastins, Krisjanis Kronins, MTO and Expans Evenis /97/.

- (27.) In the beginning of Aug. 10 h, Hehn's wife joined many Latvians who were fiscing their country fearing a second communist occupation; enother reason for her leaving was Hahn's decision to recain in latvia as a partisan which she fall she was not able to do. Her first lo ation was in Vienna where he passed an examination which enabled her to practice dentistry. In the end of October she the -- with the help of Valdmanis -- proceeded to siesbaden, where she gave with to her first shild, a son Valdis Antons, on 23 April 1945.
- (28.) In the middle of September 19th, though slates for a "Compat Police Regiment", Hahm, through Rikards influence, was transferred from the police to the 212 Comb. Int. group. In the end of Sept. 19th Sahr reported to the Eq. of this group which was lected in Timusi near Extile. There he was issued a German Army uniform, a side arm, identification (Spigman), and was assigned some Extrant which Hahm does not recall.

It should be noted here that a similar group known as the Eurelia group after its commanding officer former latvian General Furelia, was formed with the sention of the German authorities. This group, the same as FFB, was under the direction and supervision of the 212th Comb. Int. group through which both groups were also supplied. The ultimate assignment of this group was assigned the same as that of the FFG, though ord, inally the Eurelia group was assigned the task of assisting the German Aray to protect high from a Euseian attack. Jansons attempted to unite the FFG and the Eurelia group by talking to Eurelia chief of staff Cept. Upolniets, who appeared such unification because, according to Upolniets, the FFC was too such under German control and homes not as actionalistic a body as the Eurelia group. (Mahn and other FFS numbers differed with this opinion.)

Later, in Eurosse, in the beginning of Hovemoer 1944 the Germans discovered several activities of the Eurelia group which to them seemed peculiars

- a. Fearing a complete colleges of the German lines in Latvia, the majority of the 212th Comb. Int. group returned to Germany. The Eurelis group considered this as an indication that their responsibility to defend their country had begun. Consequently, the Eurelis group proclaimed itself as the core of the Latvian Estimal Army and requested all Latvians to appear for service for their country.
- b. The result of this proclamation was that a considerable names of Latvians joined Eurelia forces. However, many of those were -- as Eurelia Natra later admitted -- communist agents and secontary from the Latvian region.

The chase which the fear of a collapse of the front has created, subsided when the German Army and the Latvian Legion were able to stabilise the line.

This emabled the German subscritics to consider Expelie activities further and

(29) With the German retreat from Bot min, remove in Riga had ity that the Betonians managed to proclaim their innependence and establish a temporary government. This brought about some streetfighting with the German Army rembants. Spruned by this example the Latvians also began to plan such a government thich would assume power with the aid of the Latvian Legion. Rikards from PPS was assigned the Maison with this provisional government /99/ which had made all preparations to flee to Sweyten if there appeared difficulties from either the German in Russian side. However this project failed implicitly when Liu-Gol. Beenitis, one of the instigators, revealed this secret when under the influence of alcale. As suspected no drastic measures before taken by the German auto-prities, who did send some for the major figures to Germany.

The PPS which was informed of thir project and expected to fight was assigned the task of communicating with the provisional government and in case of trouble— aid this sovernment in its mole from Latvia to Sweden. In order to instruct the units in

Vidence, H, proceeded to the vicinity of Asia with the expresental instructions. At present H can only recall two local groups that of the brithers Earlie, Jania, and Peteria RUCOVI /180/ and that of former Signia sivil fidige and Rikards brother-trade for RUCOVI /180/ and that of former Signia sivil fidige and Rikards brother-trade flow for RUCOVI group. Rikards assigned Jansons to take his place in Rige.

During this time Valdemars and his friend Eugers Emcinis (101), both 195 members, requested the 112 Comb Int. group to give them permission to becain in Riga and join to existing, illegal communist underg ourd forces which were availing the arrival of the Russian forces and which had a tempted to permuse Ervania to join this forces. This proposal was rejected by the Germans because they had no possibility to check on its authenticity and suspected it may be a provocation attempt. Secsiving no support and cover from the Germans, Maldemar and Ermania had no choice but to abardon their plan and eventually leave Riga with the other PPS numbers.

In the first day of October 1)44 H and Roberts Erastins were ordered to Eurseze Security where they were to find suitable quarters for the \$68 in EMIDICA shere they were also to m et fon Firks. Arriving there they found for Pirks who was to furnish support

to the PPS gorilla grape had left for Insterburg, Germany. The officer who gave them fy this information advised H and Erastine that they too proceed to Insterburg. However, they told this German officer that they had no distre to leave their hemeland. Hahr, and Erastine found suitable quarters for the PPS in Euldiga through the aid of the chief of Euldigas let police presinct, Janie Varage who had a radio operator under his direction and was leader of all PPS groups in the Euldiga area. It was anticipated that Varage radio operator would become the communicator between the groups in Riga and the PPS in Sweden should the latter be forced to flee there.

Having found the necessary quarters, H and Emstino returned to Rigs, where they remained comparative inactive until the fall of Rigs on 13 October 1944. Buring this time H travelled between Rigs and Majori (on the Rigs shore) whire the 212th Comb. Int. group had set up forward Hq. On 11 Oct 1944 H was in Rigs for the last time and attempted to tersuade him parents and older sister to flee from Latvia, (Hains jounger sister had left for Germany with her two children decause the Germans had forced her humbard to come to Germany.) Hahn's parents and older sister refused to leave technise:

- a. They were too old to become himeless wanderers.
- b. They were assured by the wife of artist ROKARS SUTA, fru BELCOVA that H's parents were in no danger. Sue gave this assurance because her husband, a communist sympathiser had accompanied the retreating Bussians in 1941 and was expected to return with them as a rowerful individual.
- a. H's older sister was also persuaded by Mrs. E. PERIES, one of the leading persons in the Mational Welfare Agency by which H's older sister was/employed, that to leave Latvia at such a crucial time, would not only be deserting the sinking ship, but would also enable the Russians to Russianize Latvia much easier as none of the imballigensia would remain.

Rikards, fearing arrest, arrived in Eurome and went into hiding and complete inactivity in LIELIESE and swaited the opertunity to flee to Sweden. In the end of Oct, this opertunity presented itself and Rikards began his journey by boat/however, the boat developed motor trouble and Rikards was apprehended by the German authorities to whom he emplained that he was attempting to flee to Germani Shortly thereighter Rikards was released and attempted to rejoin the PPS which, however, turned hill down as it was still his intention to flee to Sweden, while the PPS the-consisted only of numbers of were to remain in Latvia; furthermore, there was some animosity now between those who had continued to work write likards just sat around swaiting an opportunity to escape.

The task of creeting stay-behing nets in Talsi fell to STRADS, while BREMSMITS undertook this task in LIEPAJA and vicinity and EUGENS in AIZ-UTE where he used the alias
QAVJA. ZALCHARIS was assigned to work in the Information section which was headed by
MITREVICS. One of the original three PPS members, KRASTINS was charged with establishing
stay-behind nets in the vicinity of TU/CNS.

(34) In the begining of 1945 H was able to contact the illegally living remaints of Eurelia group which had united themselves and assumed the name "TINTURA STRUMBER" (the riflemen of the legendary here VindTERS). This group was led by former police Captain FETERIS SAKSONS /114/, a very efficient organizer who was assisted by EMESTS RIKERTS /115/. The Vicature Strelnicki believed that illegality was the play to success because the Germans had become such two insettine. Though they already had experience in such illegal life and though they — a coording to Semeone—they consisted of 2,000 men, they lacked the support the Germans could furnish. Consequently is provided them such support as well as documents which would aid them should beey be approximated by the Germans, because he felt that there was no difference between the aims of the Viceture Strelnicki and the PPS, though the practical achievaent of their methal goal was envisioned by each in a different tay."

In the begining of March 1945 the news arrived that a best from Sweden would arrive for the purpose of exciltrating some persons. So that a person representing the evential stay-behind elements could be sent to Sweden, but had no authority to speak and act in the name of those remainings from SUBCIS/114/s INORIDA VIESME /117, LIJA EXCENSION/118/s (Later RIEKSIS told H in Sweden that the formers upon his arrival, had begged the LOP for aid, but found nobody who would listen to his pleas. Roberts Osia /119/, who they felt was sufficiently qualified and acceptable to become the chief of all partiesns when the Germana capitulated. Osis, however, teolined the offer, because he full that his place was with his regiment, we the front. Nevertheless, Janeaus, fully denvinced of the need to tring the Latvian Legion into the stay-behing fold, continued to employe this contility with other officers such as, Major ESTIPHIEES/120/, Major Eccine/121/cnd Dat Lt, MIEENVALDES ADMICUS /122/.
All his efforts were, however, in vain, because all efficers doubt not see the necessity to organize such a matter ratio to the capitulation.

Valdenars was at that time being trained for the position of assistant (for special assignments) to Cart. from UJERTS /123/, which of the Political Police. Secause of the short period of time Vefore the Germans capitulated, this "government" was not even able to get properly organized and hence tome to nothing.

(36) There was another, independent, attempt in Eurosee to organize a Latvian temporary government at this very time. This attempt was supported by H and the PPS which helped to find suitable farmer and labor representative. Despite German threats of reprisals, the majority of representatives not in Buildigs one day before the German forces surrendered, on 7 May 1945. Cinters was requested to strive for such abiquents so that the opposition elements would not be left alone when the Soviets occupied all of Latvia. H's and Jamanes position in demanding such and from Br. Cinters was streamgthened by the fact thaty Bileskains and Friendelds, two leaders of the actual operators of Dr. Cinters (respectively Tepfers) organization, joined H and Jamanes in this request, and indicated disatisfaction with the manner in which Cinters led and Organized activities had been hardled florestofore, i.e. that in numerous cases Br. Cinters had liven preference to political considerations rather has to merit and necrossaity. To this Br. Cinters replied that he still had 300 persons who are to be ferried to Sweden and that it will be possible to conduct this activity with much greater speed because of the arrival of Springs he further also claimed that the requested support could certainly be sent with those boats which were arriving to ferry across the aforementioned persons.

Approximately 2 weeks before the capitulation grain talked with finters and proposed that the fmilles of those persons engaged of Christian activities also

be transported to Sweden. Dr. Cinters promised to take care of this as whil.

H feels that Dr. Ginters was aimore in his promises and no doubt requested aid from Sweden as wall as sufficient boats for all persons stated for teansportation. However, H believes, that Dr. Ginters requests were not taken into consideration because not a single boat arrived from Sweden after 5 March 1945. Later, in Sweden, Dr. Ginters informed My that when he (Dr. Ginters) arrived in Sweden, he resigned from the LOP because he was extremely disstisfied with the action of the LOP during the final period.

(38) In the begining of April 1945 the IPS suggested to Jankava that a more nationastically acceptable Latvian temporary governments

be created. Mahn, supported by Fitrevice proposed Valdmania as the political head untile the aforementioned Col. Only would become the military chief. For this purpose Mahn and Hitravice proposed they fly to Germany. Jankava who reported this to his superiors received a favorable reply and Mahn and Hitravice made the necessary preparations for their increasy to Germany. However, the plane that was to fly these to Germany brought from Germany Aleksandra Akmentina and it. Deugavietia //ll/who advised Mahn and Hitravice that it was useless to attempt anything in Germany because complete confusion reigned there. This made Mahn and Mitravice decide to cancel their flight.

(39.) Shortly after the German liquidation of Eurelis group, 200 of its members managed to hije in the surgeme forests and after awaile joined a communist partison group, known as the "hed arrow". In the middle of April 1945 Rahn happened to meet one of these 200 men, ligt. Benitis /132/, who informed Hahn that the former Euralia group members were desirous of leaving the company of the "Red Arrow" group because they had nothing other than an illegal existence in demon with that group and because the Germans were hunting them because they were erroseously thought to be members of the "Red Arrow". Senitis indicated that the 200 men were willing to fight the Russians if the Germans would permit them to legalise themselves. When related this to Jackeys who contacted the SS Chief in Kursame and precured his consent to permit these 200 men to come out of the woods and legalise themselves. The intent behind this was that these 200 men would then be added to Jankare (Jagdveroands) stay-behind organization. decause of transportstion difficulties Hang was unable to arrive on time at the appointed accting place where these men were to be met, with the result that the men fetred some sort of deception from the German side and, utilizing the lull in the German attempts to locate them, successfully escaped from their area failing to keep

the erranged empointment with Mahn. The derman army officer, Fajor Arendt, who was in charge of the operation to capture these 2 O men and the "hed Arrow" group, complained that Mahn had disrupted what seemed to be a prectically successful mission. Mahn was requested to reply by indereseent which he promised to do but which he never actually iti. Mahn claims he feared that for this episode he would surely be punished, possibly with a death sentence; however, the emire matter apparently was soon forgotten in the confusion that existed in the last few weeks before the Jerman currender.

(19.) About a week before the surrenier Mitrevice finally convinced Januare that the Germans would be in so position to furnish support to the stay-benish groups, and consequently Jankers agreed to give hitrories the necessary authority, aredentials, signal plans, and other date, so that the latter may proceed to Assist and attempt to procure western aid for those remaining in Latvia. With Jackeys approval for such mission, Mahn introduced Mitrevies to Dr. Ginters who by that time had received 50 approval to continue his activities. Or. Ginters procised to sid Fitrevice in getting to Reden. On 6 May Bileskales, who was ilrectly involved in the organisation of expeditions to Sweden which originated from Latvie, had erranged that an entire convey of posts (about 5 or 6) would leave the latvies shores. Just prior to the finel errengements dikeskelne was arrested by the Germane, who freed him on the following day, As a result of Mitrevice intervention which was successful because Pitrovies could speak in James's mane, having proof of such authority. Consequently, on 8 May 1945, the day the Gormans capitulated to the Asselsme in European (incidentally, this was two days after V-E day), this commy of boots, derrying enong others Attrovies and Andersons, left the Ventepile herbor.

busenly possible he would send couriers from Sweden 50 Lielinos where they were to be received.

On 7 Mar 1945 Mahn met dilectains for the last time, At this meeting the inter stated that he would remain in Latvia and provised Mahn that should Hahn ever plan to leave for Sweden, attankains would give him an address of a person in Sweden to whom Mahn could turn for aid. Mahn parted with Hilmskains after they hade arrangements for subsequent clandestime meetings; also during this meeting dite mentioned that he wad no fear of the impending Ausmian occupation because he had memorum friends and sequalistances among the semunists who were willing to aid him.

Reving left Wentepils on the evening of 6 May 1965, the bost convey had been able to get within eight of dotland when it was surprised by Museian patrol bosts which eposed fire upon the last bosts. Subsequently they were transferred to the Rige city jell.

During this time Mahn also contacted two foresters with whose he was acquainted and who resided in the vicinity of his number. These foresters, from Shumenfelds and Olgante Russania (who at that time was using the documented alias Terra Liepins) were trusted by the communists and supported Mahn quite extensively.

on I June Hahn and his original travelir, companion as well as two additional members left the bunker and proceeded toward Talsi for the purpose of locating the Talsi partisan hq. Locating the previously arranged dead letter drop, they found no news and left a message at a live drop to meet on a future date.

Prom there Hehn's group proceeded to the vicinity of Piltene arriving there in the middle of June 1965. There they managed to locate the Piltenes group as well as Vilis Zvanitajs who remained with the group. The Piltene group, it was found, had added a member to its ranks, let Lt. Vairage, a former Legion officer who had been wounded in the weeds and picked up by the Piltenes partisans. Speaking several languages, including Russian and English, Vairage listened to news broadcasts in those languages, and hoped to be able to escape to belgium where the officers of the Latvian Legion had previously arranged to meet.

Hahm and his group ment proceeded to return to Kuldiga where they found the partisen groups had been annihilated and that they could find no news regarding Jamesss whereabouts when they had been seeking.

In the end of June Eahn shot and killed his first and only human being, a Russian AEVD man who came to inquire as to who Eahn and Sternbergs were. On that same day Eahn met Jameone wife who also was trying to locate her humband. Though she had no further name about him, she did relate all she know about the last boot convey and how the participants had fored.

Hahn and companions then continued their journey to Elekas where they contacted Lt. Sturis who then arranged that Hahn and his friends remain in the numbers

under his control. In the beginning of July Sturis and CD man decided to return to his native area the vicinity of Strength where he planned to continue his partison activities. From to leaving he gave Hahn all his contacts which Hahn subsequently used to great advantage. Hahn later heard that Dturis had successfully reached his native area and was receiving sufficient support. Sturis assistant it. In Oultis remained in the vicinity of Zlekas and proved to be extremely active in the future.

After a 4 days stay in 41ekas, Mahn proceeded to the vicinity of Dandaga where he kept his previously arranged meeting with the Talsi group. This seeting revealed that this group was by far ine largest consisting of approximately 90 men, and that the group had contact with other groups in the area who were led by: fmm Felsberge £135%, Lt. fmm Bonsaks (operated in Engure area), and Major fmm Ahmenkelejs £136%. This group, it was also found, was already at that time publishing and distributing news from the free world which they produced via radio monitoring. Prior to departing, Hahn arranged a future meeting.

On their way to Lielirbe, where they hoped to find news about Jansons and ethers, they met 2 foresters, fru wankalns from Gibsde and fru Kirosnikovs /137/ from Dundage. The letter was a friend of Kitrevice and quite anxious to fice to Sweden. Hahn promised he would see about this possibility and kept these two foresters in mind as future contacts who had good relations with the Mussians. Pries to erriving in Lielirbe, Madikis shot a bussian who happened upon the group. This created a disturbance and the Russians wegan combing the woods, causing Maha and his group to leave the area and heaf for the Elekas area.

(41.) Journeying to Elekas they found Jamis Zalemanis and lat Lt. Erike Modesgruntaides whom they added to the group. Proceeding further they also located war correspondent Peteris Savejs who also joined the group. Arriving in Elekas in the end of July 1945 and having two war correspondents, Savejs and Ealemanis with them, Hahn's group began

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to publish a periodical Tevennei Un scrivibal (For Fatherland and Freedom).

this paper stated that it was published by the satvian national partison organization (1970) and was published twice monthly.

(if.) In their travels throughout Pursens Starmbergs, Erastims, and failties noted the meed for an overall leader who could white all groups which at that time were completely independent and under the leadership of one individual. The benefits of a union of these groups under one leader are obvious; however the difficulty was that there was no one with a big enough mass or high enough rank to assume such a position. Consequently these 3 members of Sahn's group decided to create a firtitious Colonal who they would claim is the accepted leader of all partisans in Europe. The classestime and complicatorial living of the partisans afforded the necessary secrecy, so that no one lared to ask the "Colonal's" mass or his whereshouts. According to Laiva, he was instructed to find out the strength of the partisans in Eurasse, their other leaders, their locations, their radio communications possibilities, details of their safe houses, support points, and parales. Laiva further informed that Aboline had been kept as a hostige in case he (Laiva) should be detected; furthermore, the HEVD did not trust Aboline sufficiently.

Laive was then asked why he had not informed the continue that he was in the service of the NEVE; then told also that had he tone on, then could have gained a great deal of information by doubling he into the third. According to Valdemars in 1948 Andersons was in a special cump in Russia and could not be contadted.

About 2 weeks before leaving, Mrs. Alise Lejins, a coworker of H{s group, was arrested at a house in PiANI. On the way to Ventepils, she escaped from the MRYD during the night and returned to Hahns group in the woods. She then related that she had seen Armitis and another man (Petersons or Smits) who were being led toward Ventepils under guard.

- (12) The following two indications lead Hahn to believe that the accrtime Lukins operation of Christmas 1946 would possibly have been supported by French intellaigence; Mahn has no further substantiating evidence.
- a. In 1946 in a conversation the general trend of which Hahn does not recall, Lukins informed him that he is knowledgeable of a French penetration operation. Though Hahn could not recall the date of this operation, he believes it to have been said to have occurred in 1946. The operation was a subcarrier infiltration which intended to land one or more Latvian agents on the Lithuanian coast from whence they were to proceed to Latvia. The Latvian agents were recruited in Sweden, their recognitor or their training area not being known to Hahn.

The operation was unsuccessful because the submarine was forced to return since it was believed that the Soviet coasts, defense guarum had noticed it.

b. Estra Alberings, daughter of former Latvian Minister of Agriculture, was and is still today very interested and very active in parties outport and assistance work in Germany, she recently visited Silde a former undercround member in Latvia. In general she is known to travel a great deal). Her previous back-ground consisted of attending the French Lyceum in Riga which was an institution of grasmar and high school levels in which the French Language was used exclusively and in which the French in-fluence was great. Estra Alberings was the sistress of Eriks Robesgrundsieks, Skobes operational assistant.

It may be of some significance that in the summer of 1947 Eukins participated in a boy soout jamboree in France, as he had been the Latrian boy scout leader in Sweden.

Those applicants with families could be assured that their families would be cared for and would be placed in a safe place outside of Swedge in ease of war. ... plahn indicated doubt that the Swedes would be able to axcomplish all this and that their own house was clean, is. Hahn believed that the Tibars were penetrated by communist agents.

Lengthy deletes ensured which laster for into the might and in in the early morning H Dr. Ginters finally revealed to/that the Broadway was behind all this. Dr. Ginters further amplified this by saying that the Broadway was behind Tilhury group unknown to the Tibers and that his fact must not only be withheld of all cost from the Tibers but also from all other latviens. From the Broadway contact with Tilbury the fellowing Broadway interests and ordinions could be evidenced:

- a. Breadysy believed that in case of a flux ian invasion of Sweden, the Swedish people would be poor opponents to the Russians while the Latvians, who were experienced and would surely oppose the invaders would make much more suitable partises leaders whom Broadway could then sup ort.
- b. Broadway would be able to support Latvian partisans much more matisfactorily than the Tibers.
- c. Ossrentees for families of Latvian participants have been given by Greatury (and not by the Tibars as stated before)
- d. Breadway would judge by the biographies which individulab would be acceptable to them.

Though at first Hahn felt that it was unwise to furnish biographies to the Tibars he agreed to furnish them to Broadway because he falt that this was sufficiently secure. To this Dr. Ginters added that the biographies were to be furnished as seen as possible because it was intended to EMPIN begin training very shouly. Hahn feels that this urgency had some connection with the current international situation at that time (the Berlin airlift at had just begun). Purthermore Dr. Ginters felt that Hahn should personally meet Tilbury with whom he could then discuss this matter.

On 10 August 1918 Hehn met Tilbury in the presence of Dr. Cinters. Tilbury also assured Hahn - who specifically requested such assurance - that he Tilbury had no political interests in this operational work and that he Tilbury could wouch for no LCP connection and interference in this matter. Regarding training in Justice, Tilbury felt it would present a problem in that it would be difficult to conceal total until that time no solution had been found.

THE Tibury also mentioned during this conversation that this work had been begin by him, Dr. Ginters and former Latvian Ambassador to Oweden Valdemars Salnejs; Filbury further stated that since Salnajs had just died, the two remaining, he and Dr. Ginters, would have to continue alone.

During the following months Hahn furnished three further gx biographies about Dr. GEORGS FURNISHOYS, JAKIS SULSITIS, and Lat. Army Capt. JAKIS JAKKAYS. All these applied for the aforementioned G group(See para 15, on Hahn's advice. These and the biographies of Hahn and REFILLOW were the only once furnished Tilbury by Hahn, as the latter-influenced by \_\_\_\_\_\_ suspicions = also was somewhat uncertain as to whether or not Tilbury political ambitions would evain come to the fore. Later, writing to Dr. Cinters, Hahn used the excuse that he did not ressess the means to travel extensive by and hence the small amount of biographies; the bruth of the matter was that Hahn decided to await any substantiation to his belief that Tilbury would again begin his political meddling.

- (16) The following indications lead Hahn to believe that WOLDENARIS SALMAJS, former Lat. Ambassador to Sweden who died in the summer 1948 in Sweden was Tilbury go that with the Broadway.
- a. Tilbury in his talk with Eahn mentioned SALEAJS as one of the three leaders in this group, the others being Tilbury himself and Dr. Ginters.

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b. SALINAR, according to TILVER was very active during the war in continuing contact with Letvie.

c. Just prior to the German surrender Wahn was informed by CHWALDS RILESKALES, that in case Wahn ald indeed proceed to Sweden, RILESKALES would furnish him the name of one of the foremost Latvians in Sweden who is in a position to put Wahn in contact with a western desocracy which would be able to aid the partisans. This RILESKALES never had the opportunity to do.

On the other hand, VOLTEMAR related to Name in 1948 that NILESKALES has informed him, that FILDUMY has been in contact with REMAINAY since 1936. (Later, in
Narch 1950, the REMAINAY case officer who contacted Hahn in Sweden replied to Nahn's
question as to whether it was true that FILDUMY has been in contact with DEMAINAY since
1936 by brushing it off and saying, that it is true, but that this was not a very
serious, but rather just a "routine" contact which BRAINAY has been in the habit of
undertaking and keeping with many important and well-known Latvien high-ranking officers.

(17) In October 1968 Hahn received a phone call from HUDO CINTERS who informed Hahn that an acquaintance from Latvia had arrived and that HUDO CINTERS would do all possible that this acquaintance get to see Rahn. After one week Hahn received a letter from VOLUMEAR in which be told Hahn that the battle in his homeland is continuing and that one of the leaders there (it later developed that this was SCYALDS STIRSKANS) still bolds Hahn in high regard because of his excellent activities in Europeas.

In the beginning of November 1965 VOLUBRAR arrived in Hid, Sweden, Hehn's having received money for the trip from BONDE and instructions how to reach Hahn from OINTERS. According to VOLUBRARS, the Swedish authorities did not attempt to detain this in any manner and, after a thorough debriefing conducted by an TIEMES staff number in German as well as by TIEMES himself, Volumer was permitted to visit Hahn. The reason this permission was so readily granted, Hahn believes, is the fact that TIEMES, no doubt, then considered Hahn to be a member of his group and homes believed that Hahn

Just mior to leaving Stockholm Volument was informed by HTT STITES that he (H. STITES) had seen to it that Volument's dossier was completely removed from the general files of the Aliend Commission and placed in a very special file to which only one Swedish official had access. Later, in Mid, Hahm helped VOLUMENT procure a ration card which, along with his identity documents, was in his true name, although whenever possible VALDEAR used the alias VALDEARS JAMESUNG.

Remaining with Hahn until the end of January 1919, VALUERAS related that he (VALUERAS) has agreed to one erate with TILNUM giving TILNUM his word of homor that he would work with no one else. Honce VALUERAS had been forced to reject HUDO CINTERS to put him in touch with ALS. HUDO CINTERS claimed that he had such contact with an American who is quite anxious to neet him. HUDO CINTERS then described the meeting place which to Hahn sounded like the US Embassy in Stockholm HUDO CINTERS did not reveal any further details about his US contact, except to say later, after VOLUERAS had declined, that HUDO CINTERS American friend could not understand my VALUERASS would not each contact with the US.

During his stay with "shn VALDENAR expressed regret the he had been unable to fulfill two wishes requested by the partisans in Latvia:

- a. To work only directly with foreign intelligence agencies.
- b. To seek perticularly 3 contact.

Hehn told VALUEUR that he felt that VALUEUR had been affected by the high reack of THERE to when he could not show insubordination as a former enlisted man. Be that as it may and whatever the reasons may be behind it, VALUEURS felt he could most break the promise he had given THERE. Valdemars also expressed regret that the letter that Hehn wrote in reply to VALUEURS letter did not reach him before he made his promise to THERE. In this reply Hehn warned VALUEURS not to reveal analything prior to studying the entire situation. Hehn had further explained to VALUEUR that

At first their plan was to procure US aid through H. GINTERS, however, this was later chanced because LUKINS claimed that it was he and not H. GINTERS who had contact with the US. In fact H. GINTERS was claiming that he had contact with US officials when, according to LUKINS, it was LUKINS who had the actual contact on which H. GINTERS based his claim. LUKINS then revealed that it was the US Haval Attacho in Stockholm with whom he was in contact and who had supported the abortive Christmas 1916 expedition.

18. In the end of January 1969 VALDEGAR, When and JATIS ERRES begain training in radio Russian Army CO, tradecraft, and firing in proparation for a Spring infiltration. The training was conducted by the following TIEDARS case officers in Garman Language: emodding and decording instructor—JANTOR, Radio Chief Instructor—SDMANSOW, Tradecraft (2 hrs.) ANAMANAM OS and firing instructor who also was in charge of all training, — Capt. ANDREASON, (a third, another radio instructor, Mahn cannot recall.

Since in the beginning, when Hahn were recruited, there was some reservation in Dr. Giuter's mind that Hahn should be used for this mission, and since as training should be used for this mission, and since as training progressed it developed that JANIS KMIMS was unsatisfactory for such an undertaking, TILBURY requested that Hahn come to stockholm where TILBURY then stated that his superiors desired some clarity as to how many Latvians would participate in this operation. Hence TILBURY desired a final answer from Hahn. Hahn claims that he then declined to participate in the infiltration because of the following reasons:

- a. In a discussion with Veldemers, Hahn and he both felt that, had the landing site been somewhere on the Letvien coast, Hahn would have been of great help. But since it has been decided to use the Lithuanian coast, Hahn could not be as useful.
- b. Valdemars claimed that his organization was having enough difficulty legalizing those Letvians coming out of the woods or returning from Russia proper, that Hahn would only be an additional burden; furthermore Hahn never having had experience in illegal living would, no doublt, have to be "led by the hand" and would "jump every time he saw a hussian".
- c. TILBURY's lack of security, as well as the fact that one of the Lithuanina trainers had, when insbristed revealed that an operation was to be undertaken, caused Hahn to mechanider. Furthermore, a meeting with LUKINS not only strengthened his fears of lack of security, but also revealed that this operation had politicovertones because LUKINS stated that all LCP sembors were saying

that "now they really had the right men roine owr". Beliting this evidence of political overtones to Ir. Guiters (Helm aid not reveal the source), Dr. Giffers said that such could of be the case and that this was only "the talk of the LCP opposition".

- d. Valdemare also desired that Hahn remain in the western world, because he (Valdemare) then felt that then a capable person would remain this side of the iron curtain who could not only be depended upon, but also could attempt to activity the underground organization which was to a great extend divorced from Valdemars group.
- 19. The course lasted two months, was very general in nature, and lacked proper control and security, although the instructors were quite satisfactory.

So that the Latvian partisans would not lose the possibility of U. S. aid, as already mentioned. Valdemars arranged a signal plan and contact chain with Hahn which wer completely divorced from that arranged by TILBURY with Valdemar. In addition KALMS, in the U. S. was notified that representative from the homeland partisens had arrived and that he should do all possible to arouse U.S. interest in this divorced and separate operational plan of Halms KALME answered only 6 months later, which caused Hahn and Valdemar to decide to contact in order that radio contact with Sweden (Hahn) be arranged in the presence of Valdemar LUKINS, who had a radio set at his disposal. It was arranged that LUKINS, whose radio operator JANIS LAIGA (now in U.S. since 1949) would not be knowledgeable of the code, but rather would become the "technician" in charge while Hahn would encode and decode all messages; no conditions

that LUKINS would see the traffic were made. 20. JAMIS KRUMS, the 3rd trainer, formerly of SKOBER group, wrote to 8.08E in England and among other items, mentioned the fact that a person had returned from Latv's. SKOBE thereupon wrote to Hahn. requesting the latter to confirm this information and also informing Hahn that he is working for BHCAFRAY. Habn resided that KRUMS was imagining things which, incidently, he often did and for which he was well known. The fact that SKOBS was working for BROATWAY was revealed by Hann to TILBURY, who showed - islike that such was the case, though Hahn thought that some coordination was now needed. 21. Shortly, before the overation Valdener showed lishin a written document which TILBURY had given to VALIBNAR. This document which was destined for VALLEMANS organization in Latvia and which TILBRUY requested VALDENAH not show to Hahb, contained the general as well as internal Latvian emigre situation, the latter clearly indicating that LCP had supremacy in Latvian politics and stating quite felsely - that the LCP is the only organization which is now and has ever done anything for the literation. This decileation was signed by MINTAUTS CARSTE, one of the LCP leaders and son of the first Latvian President JANIS CARSTE; signing this document be used the pseudonym "ZIBMELIS". In this declaration VALIENARS was called "VALTERIS". According to Hahn, VALDEYARS was documented as VALTERIS RIMESTITS in 1944/45 in Kurseme.

Hehn claims that TILBURY too had asked for these letters, but was told that they had been burned)
