





It is sensible of him to plen to do his investigative work in a feshion and under auspices which will get him a Ph.D. degree. I trust, however, that in doing so he will successfully pursue his own goals with a high degree of intellectual integrity and independence of the "apparently ell-powerful, coercive authority" of the degree-granting institution. By this I intend no disparagement of the institution of his choice, -- I merely mean to indicate that the grant is to him for his study, not dependent upon conforming to degree requirements.

I see reason to hope that his approach and the publication of his results (and the subsequent academic scrutiny of his study) will help to establish a rore clearly action-criented constation of the concent of "attitude," which has been too much "paper-and-pensil" oriented in the literature of sociology and social psychology.

One aspect of his basic problem, which seems to me of the greatest practical importance, as well as the decreat theoretical significance, may be stated: How does one establish and maintain morale—an integrating sense of shared commitment to a highly valued cause—when the others (those with whom one shares the commitment) are "imagined" persons, remote, or in indirect contact, rather than physically present, in direct contact?
