
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CONTRACTED OBJECTIVES



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(As stated in Contractor's proposal dated May 23.1974)

The purpose of the contract was to determine the true extent of Soviet research in the fields of parapsychology and paraphysics. A special emphasis was made on the possibility to identify that research which is directly supported by the Soviet government.

The project was expected to yield a list of laboratories, scientists and personnel associated with such research in the Soviet Union and, if possible, in some of the countries of Eastern Europe. It was also specified that an attempt will be made to outline the managerial lines of authority including the extent of coordination between laboratories or scientists and governmental agencies.

A parallel goal within the same framework was contracted as an analytical and evaluative description of the research being conducted at the above identified laboratories. Specifically, that part had to be concentrated on :

Soviet, official definition of the research areas;

Levels of priority and personnel related to the project;

Extent of material support and the quality of research involved in each project;

Known target dates for completiton of programs.

The following areas of research were to be included in the evaluative and analytical part of the project:

Human-human communications achieved by other than normal sensory mechanisms. That included research on experimental paradigms that use preternatural sensory modelities with subjects able to communicate by means of heightened normal sensitivities;

Acquisition of information by gifted subjects from nonhuman (e.g. graphic) targets or printed materials;

Training of the two abilities (above) in nongifted or slightly gifted subjects;

Laboratory techniques developed to pursue such training. Specifically, possible use of operant conditioning, biofeedback, electro-sleep and EEF monitioring;

Testing instruments (psychological, psychiatric, psychomotor, psychophysiological, dermatoglyphic, etc) being considered or used to cull from large populations potential subjects.

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(Parts of the following material have been stated in Contractor's proposal and in the Interim Reports)

While a considerable interest in parapsychological research as been consistently reported in relation to Soviet Union (Ebon, 1971, Krippner & Davidson, 1972, Krippner & Hickman, 1974, McGarey, 1972, Moss, 1971, 1974, Ostrander & Schroeder, 1971, 1974, Tiller, 1972), the situation there in this respect is quite complicated.

The Soviet governmental system is usually identified with an extremely sober and realistic approach toward any scientific endeavor. The Soviet political system also demands from everybody a strict coordination of ideological or scientific thinking with party policy. On the other hand, parapsychology is an area of scientific investigation where an unusual amount of open-mindedness and of venturesome thinking is required per se.

Therefore, an upsurge of popular and/or scientific interest in parapsychological research in Soviet Union could mean many things.

It may, of course, represent a tolerant attitude of an evoluting communist elite in contemporary Soviet society. Yet this possibility conflicts with quite a few official declarations of policy directed at Soviet scientists, (official reviews of Hansel, 1970; A. Snezhnevsky's introduction to Prokop, 1971; etc).

It may also be rooted in a strategic need to integrate spontaneous research of bold scientists and even laymen into the ideological complex of the communist society, (Khokhlov, 1968).

It may as well be nothing else but a skillful operation of KGR to entrap and monitor potentially dissident scientists who are searching for an alternative to the official ideology.

But it may also be a complex strategy of misinformation directed at the Western world, while the inner resources of selected laboratories and highly qualified scientists would be coordinated and compulsed in an intensive pursuit of concrete applications of parapsychological phenomena to the military, intelligence or diversionary goals and paradigms.

It is the latter possibility that has begun lately to emerge with an alarming degree of reality.

At the same time, the conventional avenues to verify the actual state of these affairs, like e.g. an evaluative study by a panel of qualified Western scientists is simply not applicable here.

First of all, the control of sensitive scientific information was always very high in the Soviet Union. As a matter of fact and record, the dissipation of any scientific information in such a way that it would reach the Western world is punishable by Criminal Code. As a result not only most of the Soviet scientific reports are quite difficult to evaluate or replicate in the West, but even so-called "professional" contacts with Soviet scientists are for all practical purposes unreliable

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Thus, scientific reports and data from Soviet Union that have reached Western world are either the result of a careful screening, editing and a subsequent release by trusted Soviet censors, or are artifacts manufactured for Western consumption by highly-trained "operatives" from the Department of Scientific Intelligence within KGB.


All that is especially valid for the material in the field of parapsychology or paraphysics. As a consequence, the reports available in the West are diffuse, undetailed, data are presented in very general terms, barely enough for a summary that lacks precise references to the methodology, design, analyses or even type of subjects. Specifically, the amount of information related to research groups, project topics or financial support is virtually non-existent. And that has aggravated in the recent years, when an obvious veil of secrecy has been put around the official attitude of Soviet scientific community toward the research of paranormal.

At the same time, on this side of Iron Curtain, a wave of popular superstitions has risen, on the creat of which so many "experts" in parapsychology succeeded to ride and profit. A few of them had some relationship with psychology, medical, clinical or even social, but parallel with their efforts, a tremendous development of large scale commercialization of "psy phenomena" in form of pamphlets, anthologies, anti-scientific periodicals; do-it-yourself manuals, courses at the community colleges taught by professional practitioners, seminars on exorcism, etc. has substantially obscured the field.

Generally speaking, in the fields of parapsychology and paraphysics, the traditional Western distinction between the approach of a common man and that of a trained scientist is being largely lost upon layen and self-styled researchers that are operating as "scientists" in that still controversial area of scientific investigation.

In view of all that, our opinion was that a straightforward scholarly assessment of Soviet research in parapsychology and paraphysics on the basis of traditional academic comparison with reports and data available elsewhere, would be quite difficult and probably inconclusive.

A different strategy was therefore selected for the project.



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METHODOLOGY APPLIED

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(Parts of the material stated below were outlined in Contractor's proposal and in the Interim Reports)

The selected strategy and related methodology were based upon the following operational considerations:

To determine the true extent of Soviet research in the fields of parapsychology and paraphysics, the project had to be regarded as a complex of intelligence operations rather than simple scientific inquiry.

From that point of view, it appeared that under existing circumstances the most reliable information pertaining to the objectives of the project could and should be obtained directly from the individuals who are involved or have been engaged in the Soviet research under investigation.

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But to implement those operational goals, i.e. to establish a working contact with both groups, and then to evaluate collected data, the investigators had to be equipped with

an intimate knowledge of Soviet society, specifically of the mentality and psychology prevailing in a semi-dissident scientific community;

a professional training in experimental psychology, especially in analytic methodology, in design and control of complex experiments;

a substantial training in experimental parapsychology, that is, in controls, definitions, concepts, problems and paradigms specific for that field;

training and experience in establishing confidential contacts with foreign nationals, especially with those who are living in a politically or operationally sensitive situation;

a background and experience in observing the basic rules of security and confidentiality to protect personnel, information and the authorities involved:

multilingual abilities for a direct collection and evaluation of data, as well as for the analyses of original material.

It was possible to adopt the outlined strategy because the combination of abilities described above was to an adequate extent represented in the personnel selected for the project.

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At the first, immediate and realistic stage of the project information had to be collected from former Soviet citizens who in one way or other had been involved or had been in contact with the research fields in question.

After a brief preliminary study, potential sources of that type have been detected (b)(1)

It has also become evident that on the path to detect potential (b)(3) contacts within the Soviet Union, there may be some operational gain to establish direct and personal communication with some of the West European research groups that have been engaged in a professional liason with Soviet scientists.

To obtain auxiliary guidelines for prospective interviews, documents and literature in various languages, published and unpublished, and related to the fields of investigation were scanned in search of names and addresses of personnel and/or laboratories. This information was also planned to be an aid for the initial double-check of the data to be collected.

Due to the voluminosity of the material, computerized files had to be created and the input routines programmed by the Contractor specifically for the project. All these arrangements were made with without involving in any way in the rationale of the research project as defined by the contract.

All provisions for the recording, indexing or analysis of data were obtained solely on grounds of Contractor's position with the were totally unrelated to the contracted activity. (b)(1)

It was decided that the field part of the project will be carried out and completed during the summer months of 1974. The decision was based on the following:

The activity of the team after October 1st, however, was limited to week-ends or after-officehours and that has greatly slowed down the pace of the analytical work.





The primary data in form of 24 taped interviews and 2 summaries of non-recorded conferences, were audited and transcribed in the original language by the Contractor in order to be used in the evaluation process.

From these transcripts, synopses were created for all relevant interviews. The creation and reporting of these synopses was not specified in the contract, but in the opinion of the Contractor, the information contained in the synopses might serve a useful purpose during that period of time when the primary data will undergo the process of transcription and translation by the Contracting Agency.


The complete and unedited primary data were copied on 4-track tape, interspersed with auditory signals indicating the sequence of interviews and with brief introductory comments on each recording. The resulting reels of tape were sent to the Project Officers by certified mail on December 28, 1974.

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US STATE-OF-THE-ART

Within the scope of this project, there is relatively little that should and could be said concerning research in parapsychology on the territory of the United States.

And that is because the parapsychological research in this country is so insignificant in the volume and so primitive in the professional techniques applied.

The main body of American researchers has been reared in philosophical and methodological traditions completely alien to and fully incompatible with the theory and practice of parapsychology.

While there has been lately an upsurge of popular interest in parapsychology and even some semblance of its acceptance by a few scientific societies, the surface of the challenge was barely scratched. And the relative tolerance of parapsychology as a candidate for the frontier area of psychology is indeed a very new phenomenon.

A density pattern of American publications in the area of parapsychology is included in this section. The choice of literature was mainly determined by the goal of this project and is centered around publications related to research topics in experimental parapsychology or to the philosophy of parapsychology as a new area of scientific endeavor. Yet the sample nevertheless seems to be characteristic for the field as a whole. The suggestion yielded by the density pattern that the upswing of interest in parapsychology has begun with the end of sixties is indirectly supported also by other sources (Chance, 1973; Harvilik, 1973; Krippner & Hickman, 1974; Krippner & Rubin, 1974; Moss, 1974; Ostrander & Schroeder, 1974, etc).

As a matter of fact, as recent as mid-sixties, the overhalming attitude of US scientific media concerning parapsychology was openly stated in leading publications as a firm conviction that the whole field is nothing else but a commercialized, skilfully staged hoax (Exasel, 1966/US version/ and 1970/Soviet publication/).

Two important factors have rendered this bias practically inevitable - the roots of American experimental psychology and the roots of American experimental parapsychology.

American experimental psychology, a neurotic child, born in Chicago t distraught parents of functionalist origin, raised by egotistical personality of Watson on the skimmed milk of behavioral manifesto, then trained on nultiple schedules of reinforcement in a social atmosphere termented by technological progress, - could never have anything also for parapsychology but a great deal of anxiety.

Or, in words of Carl Rogers (Rice Symposium, 1964): "(American psychologists) have permitted the world of psychological science to be narrowed to behavior observed, sounds emitted, narks scratched on the paper, and the like...". Parapsychological phenomena would hardly fit into these categories.

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US STATE-OF-THE-ART

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On the other hand, American experimental parapsychology never succeded to free itself from the stigma of "research on survival" with which it came into being in this country, (Rhine, 1934, a) or from the aura of spiritualism and methaphysical endeavors to which it was consistently linked by popular opinion (Rhine, 1934, b).

The only professional group of researchers in parapsychology in some way affiliated with a University was Rhine's laboratory in Durham. But the relationship was always very complex, led to an estrangament of Rhine's group on the West Campus and has ended in early sixities in mutual bitterness and total rupture.

The list of parapsychological organizations in the Western hemisphere, which is included in this section, yields 19 groups residing in US. No one of these associations is directly or even closely related to any serious scientific institution or university. The high-sounding titles of "academies" or "institutes" do not change much, since the fact remains that the personnel lists of these groups do not contain one single name of a highly reputable scientist, with credentials widely acceptable to American scientific media.

US periodicals related to the field of parapsychological research, (list is included in this section), present the same situation. Out of 24 main periodicals in that field in US, no one is a fully recognized journal of any scientific stature.

At the same time, the stream of recent publications in the field of parapsychology is mainly supported by popularized wirte-ups by semi-professionals. Among the American authors of publications related to the field under investigation, (list is included in this section), very few are researchers per se. Basically, they are either journalists, exploiting a fad in the popular mood, (Ebon, 1971; Hansel, 1970; Hoy, 1965; Mccarey, 1972; Ostrander and Schroeder, 1971, a; 1971. b; 1974, a; 1974, b; etc), or self-styled investigators reporting some minimal achievements in instrumentation or in statistical interpretation, (Devine, 1970; Honorton, 1970; Ry21, 1966; etc), or, in the last few years, part-timers in parapsychology who teach or research in some "bonafide" area of science and on a parallel, semi-official, track are investigating parapsychological phenomena, (Kilner, 1965: Krippner & Fersh, 1971; Krippner & Rubin, 1973; Morris, 1973; Moss, 1974; Moss & Johnson, 1972; Schmeidler, 1966, 1973; Schmeidler & Craig, 1972; Schwarz, 1972; Tart, 1969; Ullman & Krippner, 1970; Ullman, Krippner and Vaughan, 1973; Van de Castle, 1974; Worral et al., 1970 ).

The background and fields of research of a very few professional parapsychologists in the United States are available from almost any sizeable University Library. 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SOVIET STATE-OF-THE-ART



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( Some of the material presented below was outlined in the Interim Reports ).

The main block of data on which the analyses of the Soviet stateof-the-art are based, stems from recorded interviews. At the same size, clear evidence of data validity was obtained through a comparison of information from interviews with the names and locations available from published sources, both in the West and in the Soviet Union. NOt always that evidence was based on consistent coincidences between the inside information on personnel and facilities on one hand and the published material from which it was possible to extract the cross-validating relationships, on the other. Quire often, it was the detected consistency in the discrepancies between the information coming out of the Soviet Union along official channels and the data yielded by interviews that has led to a clearer understanding of the possible rationale behind Soviet shifting edicts on the field under investigations.

Basic results of the data analyses are represented in this section of the report by computer-produced lists of facilities and personnel affiliated with the research area within the scope of the investigation. In those print-outs, managerial lines of authority are outlined for some of the listed personnel, as are a few of reported relationships between various facilities, modes of cooperation between research groups, and the evidence or the degree of governmental control by specific agaiciss.

The list of facilities related to the field under investigation contains redundant information, since some of the facilities were described by various sources in quite different ways. The discrepancies here, could be partially related to the variety of "covers" utilized by RGB to camouflate its secret installations and recearch groups.

An alphabetical list of detected personnel procedes the file with information related to those individuals. Not all of the names found in the interviews were used for the tiles. When the identifying information was either incomplete or isolated as compared with other sources, some of the numes were not included in the print-curs. List of personnel is arranged alphabetically with the source indicated at the right margin of the first line. Relaudes, where detectable, are also included in the print-out.

Due to the volume of collected information and to the limitation of contracted time, a detailed discussion of facilities and personnel is not possible beyond the material selected for print-outs Exact details and descriptions are contained to the primary data which has been cubmitted to the Project Ufficers.

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under investigation were created - from the bibliographical list generated for this project and from the bibliography published by Joint Publications Research Service in Arlington, Va. under the names of E.Naumov and L. Vilenskaya, 1971.

Both density patterns show a striking similarity, namely that the peak of related publications in the Soviet Union falls on the years 1967 - 1968 and the number of literature allowed to appear, dramatically declines immediately after those years. This finding is rather significant as an indirect support of the reports, detected in the interviews, that in the year 1968 the status of parapsychological research in the Soviet Union and, specifically, the state of the channels to that research open to Westerners, have been drastically altered by the Soviet Government

The listing of Soviet publications as related to the year of their appearance and the city shows also the alternate utilization of a few research groups in the Soviet Union according to the strategical demands of a certain political situation dominating the period.

The same cluster of data is profiled in the following listings with respect to a few cities, where important research groups were or are located.

From cross-comparisons of data, an obvious pattern has emerged: it is quite clear that in the Soviet Union there are two basic categories of activity related to research in parapsychology or paraphysics,

Category A, - semi-overt, pseudo-scientific "research groups" created by the government for the purpose of a working contact with Western scientific media. Those groups have been initiated and promoted by a special section of KGB in mid-sixties. Simultannously with the beginning of that action, the gates for a wide publication of parapsychological materials were officially opened, as an integral part of the same action.

The material coming from these channels is well controlled by KGB specialists and represents a multitude of artifacts manufactured by highly trained operatives in KGb's sections of scientific intelligence. Most of the "scientists" appearing on the stage of this enterprise are in fact KGB staff officers, as it is reported by reliable sources and indicated in the lists of personne. The peculiar aspects of this well orchestrated KGB operation and the infantile naivete of Western scientists at whom the operation is sixed, have led us to label category A as a new "TRUST" of Soviet Intelligence Service, an analogy to the operation the same Service has so brilliantly carried out in mid-chirties with a salightly different operative goal.

Yes the information obtained from interviews consistently points out to the existence of second group -

Category B, highly secret, completely closed institutions and research centers in the Soviet Union, engaged in an intense pursuit of practical applications of parapsychological phenomena for the exact defined goals of intelligence, control of humans and new methods of unconventional warfare. Those groups are working on huge budgets, are staffed with extremely wall trained scientists and are functioning under auspices either of AGE or Ministry of Defense. In those institutes and research centers the sciential

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community is working on real empirical paradigms and is supported by most modern, sophisticated equipment. In those insitutes, the researchers are also enjoying immense privileges of a group favored by the government and all of them have gone through the tedios process of secret clearances. In this category, there is also a serious attempt to grasp new emerging aspects of the physical reality and incorporate it in an unconventional model of human nature and the possibility of its external control.

The distinction between the type of information related to one category or to the other is quite visible in the data. So, for instance, the names of personnel in category A rarely, if at all, appear in the data that comes from category B, and vice-versa. That distinction stands, in spite of the fact that a few names still may appear at the "junction point" between two formations. Yet the key figures and the key laboratories in both basic groups never appear ( at least not under the same name) in any reliable source of information.

The relcodes in the information describing personnel indicate automatically whether the person belongs to the category A or to the category B. Brief descriptions of affiliation with KGB or Ministry of defense, sometimes included in the print-outs, should help clairify that point.

It is also quite possible that the very purpose of the category A is to detract attention from the activities of category 3.

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

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



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DISCUSSION AND IMPLICATIONS

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It was not within the scope of the contracted project to write a treatise on Soviet research in parapsychology.

The findings were presented in this report in a deliberately brief and concise form of computer print-outs. The factual data - lucations, fields of research, names and addresses, relationship to governmental agencies, managerial lines, etc - form the core of this report.

Yet there is a wealth of other data in the tapes that have been submitted to the Project Officers. The importance of those, other, aspects of reported material should not be underestimated. As a marter of fact, that additional information might be bearing upon a few crucial issues of national security for this country. It may be worth a few words at the conclusion of this report.

It was pointed out in a few interviews that the Soviet leaders do most likely regard the atomic balance as a fait accompli. Yet the basic conflict between two incompatible systems remains a reality inspits of so-called detente. Thus, quite a few former Soviet citizens, who came in contact with the Soviet research activity in parapsychology, are convinced that the Leaders of the Soviet Union look upon research in parapsychological phenomena as a possible ultimate solution to their strategic plans. While their sense of scientific reality could be disputed here, their determination is obvious to most of the observers.

Soviet plans in this respect are nelped by the fact that their scientists do not have an a-priori bias against parapsychology. The interest of Soviet scientific community in that controversial research did not come from any other source than pure scientific curiosity, fostered by a comfortable feeling that the very philosophy of a parapsychological model of Man offers a refreshing alternative to the official, desiccated ideology.

The brief intercourse with Western parapsychologists in the mid-sixties was a revelution to both Soviet scientists and the Soviet government. Around 1968, the Soviet leadership understood very clearly that there is nothing the West could contribute to the Soviets' already existing knowledge in the realm of parapsychology. The already established channels could be maintained further according to the rules of the game that intelligence services play, but the trade traffic in parapsychological material was simply off.

The principal contact with the West in this area - E. Naumov was first to pay the price of the change. He was framed in a primitive plot with illegal lecture fees and jailed in March of 1974. His trial was the last link in a series of dramatic shifts that the Soviet government has started with the beginning of seventies in the area of parapsychological research. The flow of publications has subsided to almost zero. Public lectures were promibited, international Congresses were shifted when possible to Prague, to Zdenek Bejdek and his operative group.

And then, finally, in the late fall of 1974 an official letter was published in journal "Problems of Philosophy", the voice of the Soviet Communist Party. The latter was signed by leading names of psychologists and educators. But in reality, all those well known scientists were senior officers in causgory 2 of parapsychological research. Their message was crisp and clear for anyone who grew up in the Soviet State

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and knew its lingo: there should not be anymore layman's manipulations of parapsychological research. The area is not for games. It is a serious matter with which your State is concerned in its own way. There are no secret institutes in the Soviet Union that are engaged in covert research in parapsychology - the article continued. If someone has interest in that area of scentific interest, he must address proper authorities and they will send him to a group within Soviet Academy of Science that is comissioned by the Soviet Government to supervise all avenues of fringe research. Rumors concerning secret research must stop. And the books published in the West, in which an interese governmental activity concerning parapsychological research is reported, are simply attempts to revive the spirit of cold wer.

is a result of this letter, the average Soviet citizen understands very well that there <u>IS</u> secret research on parapsychology in the Soviet Union today. And he can guess the approximate goals of that research, as the latest popular song "Telepathy" (recorded on one of the primary data tapes) suggests. He also knows that he must not talk about that in the open and especially not to Westerners. In this respect, the letter was exceedingly clear.

The problem is however with an average Western citizen. He must likely does not understand, how advanced and intense is the Soviet research in the realm of parapsychological phenomena. And that is the fact that worries most of the former Soviet citizens whom we have interviewed.

We share their worries in this respect. The first, almost random sampling of Soviet emigrants produced (for us) a dramatic evidence of an intense research in an area that could be utilized for control of humans. There is no doubt in our minds that there is more information leaking out of the Soviet Union, the information that may be very helpful to realistically estimate the size and the nature of the potential danger.

We are therefore convinced that a further investigation along the lines indicated by the reported material is imperative in the interests of national security.

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
