MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

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1. This memorandum recommends action.

2. This is an arranged tour of civilians overseas to include some parts of the Soviet Union. It is for 29 people for 19 days at a cost, not to exceed per person, of \$2080. It is stated that the State Department will brief these people in Washington. In my opinion that should complete their governmental contact. It would be unfortunate I think for CIA to brief these people and thus establish a precedent. We do not know what these people will later say that CIA told them and of course there is the possibility later of the Soviets saying that these people are spies.

3. Our interest I would imagine would be in de-briefing them after they return.

4. Regarding the private cocktail party at the Statler on May 7, I would recommend that you reply that if possible, you would be delighted to again see Mr. Remick.
